JANUARY. 1st. Battle of Port Royal, S. C. Party of the enemy landed...

APRIL. 6th. Battle of Shiloh, Tenn., commenced and continued until the 7th.

JUNE. 1. Battle of Seven Pines ended. Gen. Jackson defeats the enemy near Strasburg.

JULY. 1. Battle of Malvern Hill; the Yankee army completely routed.

AUGUST. 1. Battle of Baton Rouge, La. Confederate forces under General Brookridge defeated the Yankees.

SEPTEMBER. 1. Battle of Cedar Creek, Va. General Stuart captures and destroys a large amount of Yankee stores.

OCTOBER. 1. Battle of Cross Keys, Virginia, Yankees defeated.

THE MILITARY EXEMPTION ACT

We present below the Military Exemption Act, which was passed by Congress on Saturday, the 4th of October last.

THE PHYSICALLY DISABLED OFFICERS, OF GOVERNMENT, CLERKS, AND OTHERS.

ALL VOLUNTEERS HERETOFORE RAISED BY ANY STATE since the passage of the act entitled "An Act further to provide for the public defense," approved April 10th, 1862...

NON-COMBATANTS. All persons who have been and now are members of the Society of Friends...

EXTORTIONERS. "Provided further, that the exemptions herein granted to persons by reason of their peculiar mechanical or scientific occupation...

EMPLOYERS OF GOVERNMENT WORK. All artisans, mechanics and employees in the establishments of the Government for the manufacture of arms, ordnance and ordnance stores...

STOCK RAISERS. "One male citizen for every 500 head of cattle, for every 250 head of horses or mules and one sheephead for every 100 head of sheep...

EXCHANGE OFFICE, No. 3. ALL Confederate officers and men who have been captured and paroled in Virginia and Maryland...
