

SECOND SPECIAL ORDER.

The bill—

H. B. 157. To authorize probate judges to order elections in certain cases to prevent the sale or giving away of vinous or spirituous liquors in this State,

Being the next special order, was taken up, and on motion of Mr. Higgins, recommitted to the committee on temperance.

By leave, Mr. Wood of Talladega, introduced a bill—

H. B. 339½. To amend an act to prescribe the time of holding the circuit court in the 10th judicial circuit, approved March 14, 1872, which was read three times under a suspension of the constitutional rule and passed.

Mr. Price offered the following joint resolution, which was adopted :

Resolved, by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring, That three hundred copies of the proceedings of the House and Senate, including as far as may be, the remarks of members, in reference to the death of Senator Ervin, be printed for the use of the members of the House and Senate, and that a copy be sent to the family of the deceased.

Mr. Beirne gave notice that on Monday, he would move to change rule 26 so that Tuesdays and Fridays of each week shall be set apart for the consideration of Senate messages, until they are disposed of.

Leave of absence was granted Mr. Bell for one day on account of sickness.

On motion of Mr. Barnett the House adjourned until Monday morning 11 o'clock.
