s. B. 416. To fix the times of holding the circuit court in the 2d judicial circuit.

By Mr. Robinson—

s. B. 417. To regulate the granting of divorces in this State;

Which were severally read the first time and ordered to a second reading.

SPECIAL ORDERS.

On motion of Mr. Cobb, the senate indefinitely postponed the consideration of the senate bill—

s. B. 313. To amend an act to abolish fencing in certain portions of Montgomery county, approved January 29, 1867.

On motion of Mr. Robinson, the senate bill—

s. B. 186. To prevent the running of freight trains along or upon the different lines of railway in this State, between the hours of 12 o'clock on Saturday night and 12 o'clock on Sunday night, including the entire Sabbath day of 24 hours;

Was laid on the table—yeas 17, nays 10.

The senate bill was taken up—

s. B. 361. To provide for the payment of the commissioners appointed under the act approved December 19th, 1874, to liquidate and adjust all claims against the State of Alabama, arising from bonds issued or endorsed in the name of the State.

Mr. Cobb moved to amend the first section of the bill, by substituting "thirty-five hundred" for "four thousand."

Mr. Grayson moved to amend the amendment by substitu-
