



# MONTGOMERY, ALABAMA

Here DeSoto and his Spanish warriors met the Indian Chiefs whose villages were built at and around the present Capitol of Alabama.

The places visited by General LaFayette still stand, and mark the visit of this historic messenger of good-will.

The Capitol of the Confederacy where Jefferson Davis was sworn in as the First and Only President of the Southern Confederacy is the present beautiful Capitol of the State of Alabama.

Montgomery is located in South Central Alabama, almost equi-distant between the Mississippi River and the Atlantic seaboard, on the Alabama River, which is navigable for light draft boats throughout the year and for heavy draft boats about nine months in the year.

Montgomery's central location and her fine system of railroads, highways and air lines, offer the tourist much inducement to stop off at Montgomery. Modern hotels, comfortable tourist parks, theatres, baseball, football, golf, swimming and other recreations and sports provide entertainment.

Cramton Bowl is the largest stadium in the state, with a possible seating capacity of 30,000. It is built of solid steel and concrete and attracts the major football and baseball teams of the South. There are a number of superior golf courses, many swimming pools and parks and a large number of nearby resorts.

## POINTS OF INTEREST

The State Capitol and nearby the First "White House" of the Confederacy.

Maxwell Field, the home of the U. S. Army Air Corps Tactical School and the U. S. Air Corps Squadron School.

Municipal Air Port, four miles from the city on the Wetumpka Road.

The Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts, at the corner of Lawrence and High Streets.

Lanier High School, on South Court Street.

Woman's College, on South Fairview Avenue.

Montgomery Country Club, at the foot of Fairview Avenue.

Woodley Country Club, on Narrow Lane Road and Woodley Road.

Bermuda Knolls, an excellent public golf course, on the Carter Hill Highway.

Rosemont Gardens and Greenhouses, on the Carter Hill Highway.

Oak Park—public swimming pool and children's zoo, on Forest Avenue.

Scottish Rite Temple, on Dexter Avenue, one block from the State Capitol.

Kilby Prison and Kilby Guernsey Dairy and Hog Farm, two miles from Montgomery on the Wetumpka Highway.

Martin and Jordan Dams and Lakes, only a short automobile trip from Montgomery. These lakes and great hydro-electric developments are well worth a visit.

Tuskegee Institute for Negroes, 40 miles from Montgomery on the Atlanta Highway.

South Montgomery and Cloverdale residential section.

Excellent golf courses, amusements seven days in the week, and an ideal climate are offered the visitor to Montgomery.














