A total of 17 deer and 16 turkeys were killed. Six turkeys were killed on the wing. Trimble did not arrive until Tuesday afternoon and expressed disappointment over his belated arrival, saying he had never shot a wild turkey and it was

his life's ambition to do so. "You will shoot a wild turkey today," promised Boykin, who summoned his prize caller. The three of them sallied forth and returned within 35 minutes, with Trimble proudly carrying a 19-pound gobbler which he had shot on the wing two miles from camp.

"This proves these turkeys are really wild," said Trimble.
