

<sup>1</sup> Milo Parker Jewett (1808-1882) was the first president of Judson Female Institute (later Judson College), which was established in 1838. He returned to the north in 1855 and later became the first president of Vassar College.

<sup>2</sup> Rev. Lee Compere (1790-1871) established a mission at Tuckabatchee in 1822 for the purpose of converting the Creek Indians. He learned their language and compiled an extensive grammar which he gave to Albert Gallatin who published it in *Transactions of the American Antiquarian Society*, vol.2. He also composed hymns in the Muscogee tongue and a history, all of which have been lost.
