

St. Stephens April 17. 1813

Major Gen. James Wilkinson.

Sir Serious apprehension of a hostile disposition in the Creek Indians towards the Americans, prevails generally among the inhabitants of Clark, and Washington Counties. Their fears and alarms have been much increased the last three or four days; many of the families residing near the Indian boundary line are preparing to leave their farms and retreat down the river for safety, a considerable proportion nearly one half of the effective Militia in these two Counties are in the service of the General Government and now under your Command at Mobile, the residue here are without arms — the facts stated by Mr Walker whose deposition we enclose are here thought sufficient to prepare for danger and be in readiness to repel aggression when offered — Our dangerous situation induces us to solicit some

aid from you - if the volunteer Cavalry under your Command were stationed along the frontiers of this settlement it would relieve the present fears of the inhabitants and probably prevent any premeditated attack - With the highest confidence that you will render us such aid as you may think our situation requires and your power permits. - We remain very respectfully
