

Belshers Ferry 28 Aug^t 1826

To his Excellency John Murphy

Sir

The negotiations between Alabama, and Georgia, have terminated this day, in a disagreement as to the point at which the line forming the p^ermanent boundary between the two States, is to depart from the Chatahoochee river, to Nickajack. We were early convinced after meeting the Commissioners, on the part of Georgia, that a disagreement with respect to the construction of the compact, according to the terms of which the line was to be run, was inevitable, and were only solitous to place the question, in that light which would enable an ~~en~~lightened Public, to pronounce a correct and impartial Judgment on the positions assumed, and the views taken by the Commissioners of the two States. Whether we have succeeded in the accomplishment of this Object, The correspondence which is herewith submitted must determine.
