

Cape Fear April 16th 1861.

My dear Sister,

I received your letter of the 11th last week, and Jan's received Sunday. Mrs. Clark, and Mr. Postonright, have returned, and we got the bundle you sent by them. Carrie was delighted with the squire, and says she is much obliged to you. She said this morning, "that Susan did not do any thing but work for her." She is writing to you now, but I doubt if she sends it. Dr. Black leaves for Pensacola, to night. Mr. M^r Stair left to day, and Mr. P^ohorne goes to-morrow. I know you will be astonished to hear what she is going.

I suppose you have heard by this time, the good news from North Sumter. Not one of our men killed or wounded! There was a Dispatch received to day saying that Virginia would secede to-day, and that 6 of the Federal

officers resigned.

I wonder what Lincoln thinks now. The next thing I expect to hear is that he has disappeared. But enough of old Lincoln.

The family are all well. Maria was coming up to spend two or three days with us. But it is so damp & cool that I do not know now when she will be able to do so. I have not seen her since Friday.

There are about 100 men here that wish to go to Pensacola, and remain until after Pickens is taken. William among them, he said he would go last night if he could. They only wish to have their expenses paid there and back, and quit stay until the fight is over, should there be one.

The "Columbus Guards" (50 men) came from Toledo this evening. Julius goes with them. He is the only one

I believe that one knows.

We are all very anxious indeed to see you, but I ~~do~~ would not like to say come home, for I could not wish to do so if I were in your place.

I saw Mr Lilly last Sunday, and if all of the men I have imputed as much as he has, I think we had better send some ^{more} down there.

I have not decided whether I will go the wedding or not. It will depend entirely upon what is going on at Pensacola. If they should have a fight, of course I could not like to go, for I could not enjoy myself.
