Camp Marietta Ga June 23rd /64

Dear Mother

After various ramblings we are at last in the Southern edge of the town of Marietta. The army after leaving New Hope Church marched to the right (East) until two miles north of Town. Then the left fell back and the line now runs nearly North and South parallel with the rail-road. There was considerable fighting yesterday afternoon. And there are various rumors. Such as 300 prisoners, and 12 pieces Artillery captured; by the Confeds. Have heard nothing definite. The news from Virginia is, as usual, good. As well as other parts of the Confederacy, I am confident that when the battle comes off here that we will be victorious

The infantry think so at least, and when that is the case it is very apt to be so. Gen Frank returned yesterday after about two weeks absence. having been sick at the Hospital. Col Hagan has again taken command of the 3rd Ala. Gen Johnston having declared Gen Martins appointments of field officers void. When Col H. took command; Col Baldwin, Lt-Col Robbins, and Maj Farnick refused to serve under him, ^{in their old positions.} and were consequently sent to the rear under arrest, and will probably be cashiered. The 2nd Ala has been in several engagements and one man from Montgomery belonging to Co "I" was killed. Havent heard from J. M. or Hunter River in a fortnight or more. Have rec^d.

no letter from home since the 20th
(or about that) of last month. Rec^d.
a letter from Charley of the 5th ind.
Infant (12) twelve months ago to-day
I was mustered into this company.
And during that-time we have
retreated about 250 or 300 miles.
But I hope that-in less than 12
months more we will advance
farther than we retreated. In
a few months Charley will come
into the army and will if he joins
cavalry ~~will~~ want a horse. Now
my advice is, that-if Father can
afford it. To buy a horse for L-
and let Secumpsch stay at home,
untill next-winter: when I
will bring Danny home, and get
him. Thus leaving a horse at-
home for any emergency that-
may arise. The one left at home

can be made useful in working
crop, or in any other way most
advisable. If it is to be had, I
had better get a ~~Saddle tree~~
the Texas order. no matter for
looks so it will not hurt a
horses back. I wrote some time ago
about shirts. If you can take
off the fancy, and breast-plate.
and put on some common buttons
if that heavy dark blue shirt; it
will do for me. And the darkest
over shirt. I had last winter.
will do for the other. And
should like to have my over-coat
hemmed round the bottoms. And ~~make~~
~~make~~ the two small aprons sewed
together the long way, that is; end
to end. And about (3) three pair
colored wooden socks. Well give my
love to all from your afft Son
