

Courier Camp Marietta Ga
June 2nd 1864

Dear Charley

I have neglected to write you before, but will try and write a good letter now. Have not heard from you since I left Dalton; and but once from home. I'll suppose that you have heard most of the war news, and wont go back any.

The army is now in line of battle about eighteen miles west of here. The line running \perp at right angles with the railroad. The latter running North-west, and South-East. Our lines, including the Cavalry on the flanks, are about twelve (12) miles long. Myself and

six other men from our compa-
ny are at this place, doing
courier duty at the Telegraph
Office. That is, carrying dis-
patches from there, to Gen.
Johnston's head-quarters. I stayed
all one day with the 3rd Ala
Cavalry, while on the retreat
from Cassville. Saw Fox,
and Frank Peyton, and most
of our acquaintances. Wash
Samuel was at home. All
of Wheeler's cavalry have been
dismounted, and put into
the breast-works on the same
footing with the infantry. The
horses being sent, two or three
miles to the rear. It is only
a temporary arrangement
however to last until the
big fight is over, we are

receiving reinforcements from
Florida every day. Being part
of Genl. Finegan's command.
For Torrel is either coming here
or going into the enemy's
rear. The dismounted men
of his command, arrived a
day or two ago, having come
around by rail-road.

Andrew Rowell (from ^{Dauntless})
who belongs to that boy compa-
ny at Selma, was up here
yesterday. Him-self and
several others from that
company, were detailed to
drive a lot of wagons,
from Selma up here.

In the eating line, we are
faring finely now. half pound
bacon, and three quarters pound
hard bread or crackers, a day.

Our horses are not doing so
well though. Half rations
corn and no fodder. My man
has fallen off some, but is still
in very good order.

All your acquaintances are
well. Finlayson of my mess,
is pretty sick with dysentery.

Georgiyev has been up here
for several days past. But
went down to Atlanta last
night. He is druggist in a
Hospital. Give my regards
to all P. boys. Hope to hear from
you soon.
