Lynchburg Va. June 13<sup>th</sup> 61

Dear Father -

We reached this place  
yesterday morning - left Cor  
with Lani Friday and so -  
were five days coming -  
Our journey was no contin  
ued train of accidents - and  
delays - but as only one was  
anything of a serious nature  
I will just mention it -  
~~the~~ ~~we~~ ~~car~~ ~~the~~ ~~whole~~  
~~car~~ were all stored  
away in freight cars like  
hogs & horses and at some  
place in Tennessee three of  
our cars were thrown off the  
tracks - fortunately no one hurt  
at all - a few days before a  
similar accident occurred there  
and ten or twelve were badly



injured - we passed one night  
repairing the track and placing  
the cars on right -  
when we again set out and  
arrived here all safe - those  
of our men who left Corinth  
sick had a very severe time  
but no one is dangerously ill  
Several of our Company though  
I believe 15 or 20 are exempt  
from duty all the time -  
well we are here now in  
Lynchburg - a healthy country  
around us - and an elegant  
situation for soldier life -  
enough water and plenty of  
provisions I suppose from  
what I've seen -

Each man had to provide  
for himself the last two days  
of trip to this place - as we  
were only furnished with pro-  
vision for 3 days in truth

we had no provision at all  
I will just tell you how we  
left Corvick - about 10 o'clock  
Thursday night last week after  
we had gone to sleep Cape  
Duvall had the drum beat -  
called out our company and  
ordered us to be prepared to  
march next morning at six  
o'clock - we had no word of  
warning before - He then -  
ordered us to cook 3 days pro-  
vision. As we did not sleep  
at all that night and after  
all our provision ~~was~~  
was enough to kill the heartiest  
man that eat it - -

we are furnishing our flour  
and just mix it water throw  
it in the oven and so cook  
it - When we left Corvick  
we supposed we were going  
to Richmond but the order

was countermanded when  
got here - there are few  
troops here besides our own  
The Antagon Rebels have not  
arrived yet we left them at  
Bristol which is on the line  
of Tenn. & Va - Col Seibels  
says they only form a detachment  
of our Regiment - He had  
made only one talk to the  
public since leaving Mount  
Gorey - at a little place  
called Stephenson, I think  
in Jackson County Ala -

Gen. E. Moore announced to its  
citizens that he was a can-  
didate for gubernatorial office  
congratulated the people of  
Ala on the unity with which  
he had been been brought  
out as an Independent Can-  
didate - "not for his own sake"  
he said but for the people's"  
said he must run the race -  
through in justice to his friends

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if he is elected I should be  
very much surprised -  
A call upon Col Seibel's brought  
him to his feet but he seemed  
to rise just to rebuke Moore  
he renounced himself from making  
any a speech - said the time  
for such had past and  
the time for action had come  
made a few other remarks  
and took his seat -  
we had ~~an~~ excellent speeches  
from Adjutant Goldthwait  
and <sup>Private J. M.</sup> Oliver at Jonesboro Ten-  
nesse - Oliver was considerably  
stirred up - These are the  
only speeches we have heard  
we passed through Knox-  
ville and saw Brownlow's  
House and through Greeneville  
~~the~~ Andy Johnson lives here

he tells the people he will  
raise the standard of rebel  
lion soon and says Lincoln  
will assist him -

We seldom talk about the  
war here strange it seems  
as we are soldiers and ~~the~~  
are to engage in it soon  
unless we are mistaken  
we still feel that we are  
at a distance from the en-  
emy and somehow we will  
continue to feel that it is  
no very serious matter -  
our camp is one scene of  
mirth and pleasure from  
morning till night -

This is a great life for one  
who loves company &  
our officers are strict and  
Col Seibel is absolutely se-  
vere - the men complained  
greatly at first but are



becoming gradually reconciled  
to his rule - this the more  
easily as he speaks in  
a ~~severe~~ severe tone  
to officers as well as priv-  
ates - he has almost engaged  
2 or 3 captains and Lieutenants  
as I suppose they will  
be first to raise the stan-  
dard of Rebellion -

All our friends are getting  
along finely together -

I ~~suppose~~ refer you  
to the Mont. Daily Post for  
some description of our life  
at Corinth - ~~the~~ The letter  
is from Jim Oliver - the paper  
is dated June 6<sup>th</sup> - it is  
amusing but not literally  
true ~~in~~ in one respect at  
least - for that water was  
outrageous - I can give you  
~~no~~ no description of our

journey to this place -  
but we passed some of the  
most beautiful scenery  
over mountains rivers -  
through rock tunnels and  
the finest clover fields in  
the world - it seems there  
is no end to this wild scen-  
ery and unbroken country.  
The poets among our soldiers  
here had no subject for medi-  
tation & composition - and some  
even became agitated as  
to compose on the occasion.

I am convinced now that  
I ~~am~~ am not a born poet  
~~But~~ I had one or two more  
words and must close

Gen Abercrombie just requested  
me to <sup>ask you</sup> forward him ~~one~~ -  
just as you would a letter  
to me - Direct to this place as  
we have no idea when we  
will leave - I will ask you  
to write as often as you can -  
have heard but once from home and  
that through Berlin - <sup>from</sup> on Crutcher's
