

Juka Mississippi
Sept. 26th 1861

Dear Father,

I promised to write again to day to let you know the result of the dispatches of yesterday or the night before. The dispatch to the "Sec of War" was not answered. We hear that Walker has given up his office. We hoped that the dispatch would find him still in office but we are afraid that he has quit serving. We expect to leave this evening or tomorrow for "Union City". It is probable that we will be thrown into a regiment which we learn is composed chiefly of low Irish men and that several have killed their own sentinels for halting them and not letting them pass out of camp at night. Our case is a hard one. But, I have resolved that wherever God and our Government directs there I will go cheerfully. I am now writing in the sick-room of young Lammie.

fixed him up. His fever has left him.
He seems much better. We have
him in a nice private boarding
house. We have another very sick
in camp. His name is Poole.
I have not been to the office yet
