

Near Chattanooga Tenn,
September 30th 1863.

Dear Father,

I hope that by this time
you have arrived safely at home
and that you found Bolling already
there, and doing well.

I learned from Ben that you did not
call at our wagons for the rations
that were cooked for you,

I fear that you suffered for some-
thing to eat before you got home,
We still hold the same position

there having been no change,
whatever in our lines since
your departure, I have not seen

or heard from Crenshaw and John
St Myrick tells me that William
Myrick his brother will come on
soon to our company. You
might arrange with him to

bring up my things. I am almost afraid though that I will get out of Pants and shoes before he comes. I would rather though that he should bring them than any one else as he is very careful, and would be certain to bring them through safe.

He can also help you to get me a pair of shoes made by Rolison. My health is still good, Lt. Myrick has recovered, and returned to the company. Col. Sawyer is suffering from his shoulder still.

One of my men had an unfortunate accident to happen to him last night. It was Thomas Davenport of Prattville. He was asleep with his loaded rifle resting on a bush by his side. In turning over his foot struck against the rifle and -

knocked it down; it was discharged
and the ball took off two of his
fingers. The men are on pretty
short rations but are getting
over the fatigue of the campaign
and are in tolerable trim for
another fight. We look forward
to new struggles but all are confi-
dent of success. Dont forget
to circulate the letter from Col Snow
yer to myself amongst our friends
not only in Autauga but also
in Talladega & Shelby Counties.
Contrive some way to send copies
to the two latter counties as more
than half of the company are
from those counties. I am
very anxious to hear from Bolling
also Frank. Love to all. Please
write soon.
