

Camp near Chattanooga  
October 26<sup>th</sup> 1863.

Dear Father

Mr Barbour expects  
to start back home tomorrow  
and I will send this by  
him. Buckner's Division  
is now in our corps.

I saw John yesterday, he  
is still well, Crumshaw had  
not come over and I ex-  
pect is pretty sick. He will  
go to see him this evening  
and see what ought to  
be done for him. I am fear-  
ful that he is not taking  
proper care of himself.

Johnny received a letter  
from Bullins and one from  
yourself yesterday. There will  
probably be one officer  
from a company sent

Some soon after clothing  
If so I think it quite likely  
that I will come, as there we  
would not be sent when  
anything stirring, <sup>was expected</sup> and my  
men need clothing and blan-  
kets so much that I will not  
trust any one else. It  
will be a laborious job  
and if I would not have  
much time to spend at home  
~~if I~~. It is by no means  
certain that the detail  
will be made. Uncle-  
William has not arrived  
yet and I fear will not  
be able to get through as  
Mr Barbour told me that  
it was only by a little  
strategy that he got  
through Atlanta.

He had to pass himself  
off as one of the "Alas  
to relief committed"  
I stand very much in  
need of pants & socks and I  
don't see how you are to  
get them through to me.  
I was rejoiced to see Bolling  
letter to John. As it showed  
that he was much better,  
I hope now that he will  
improve fast. but of it  
cannot be expected that  
he will be able to come  
back in a long time yet.  
I wrote to yourself and  
Laura a short time since.  
Tell Laura I am expecting  
an answer. I would  
like to hear from Hines  
also.
