all the excitement that we  
have for enjoyment

In regard to our company  
being willing to give more  
than fifteen dollars in  
payment of these uniforms  
I have pretty well ascertained  
and some few would be  
disposed to accept but the  
greater part of them said  
they voted fifteen dollars &  
considered it at that time  
a contract & now they are  
not willing to give any  
thing more than the 15<sup>00</sup>  
dollars voted & reported - it  
is out of my power to control  
the matter & my opinion is  
if we ever expect to send thro  
ther company we had better  
fit up the uniforms as it  
was agreed upon & let the  
matter pass this of course is  
a matter for your own  
consideration, the boys are  
expecting daily to receive  
the overcoats untill Mr  
Ellis arrived and now

from what information  
they have gained from him  
they appear to be very much  
out of humor & think if  
ever they are supplied it will  
be too late for winter. I gave  
them a few words of comfort  
and offered 15\$ cash in a few  
days and take all the clothing  
they would get & that put a  
different face on things, we  
will all have to excuse the  
boys for they have suffered  
with sickness very much  
& about 30, out from camp  
on 21 days furlow. I have  
some noble fellows. Just  
say to our community that  
the Antaya guards flatly  
refuse to pay more than  
fifteen Dollars of the  
first commutation fur-  
-ds received for the clothing  
they expected to receive  
when the matter was voted  
upon

In regard to the past little  
fight I suppose you  
are posted & in regard to  
the dispatch had it bin  
received in time we would  
have replied and should  
we get in battle and any  
one of our company get  
killed or wounded we  
will report forthwith  
Remember when all well  
after a fight we will  
only write, accept my  
highest regards
