Feb 1st 1862

Dear Father,

Capt. F and myself received your letters the other day. I should have written sooner but have been very busy. I am now well. Nothing of importance has transpired here or in our vicinity since I wrote last. There was a report that Hean- regard would supersede Polk here I hope it is true. I believe he would be welcomed by all the soldiers. Also ~~that~~ on account of this change that Gen. Pillow has withdrawn his resignation. The health of our company is not yet good. Though we have none dangerously ill at present. No more deaths. All of those on sick furlough except seven have returned most of them fat. Everything seems to be quiet. We have been paid up to the 1st of October there came to us \$35.00. I expect we won't get our commutation money soon. I received the \$50.00 shoes and socks by Lt. Myrick all right. I suppose you will have returned from Rich- mond. I hope you have ac-

ceeded in your undertakings—
there. I heard from Antwerp
though not from home that
you wished to get a commission
to raise a Regt. Of course I
don't know as to its truth.
Capt. F. said he would write
to you soon.

Let Purich is sick with sherrn
a trial. I hope to hear from
you all soon. And would
like to know something as
to your intentions of going
into the army.

I rec'd a letter from sister the
other day. Give my love to
all.

Everything seems to be quiet We have been paid up to the 1st of October, there came to me \$38.00. I expect we wont get our commutation money soon. I received the \$50.00 shoes and socks by Lt. Myrick all right. I suppose you will have returned from Richmond. I hope you have suc-

I rec'd a letter from Sister the other day. Give my love to all.
