

Camp near Sattillo Miss
July 12th 1862

Dear Father.

I had commenced a letter to you late on the 28th of June, in the evening of the, when Tom stepped in to my surprise, and the next day I had to make out a set of muster rolls, the next day we started on the march to Ripley a description of which of which I suppose, Tom has given. Tom stood the march like a hero. Two last days he rode in a wagon but we had no hard marching to do then.

My duties have been so heavy since arriving here a few days since that I have had no opportunity to write.

I was very glad to see Tom. I cannot tell you yet I do not think in fact I know that a company can not be transferred from the seat of war to a Regt at home. I have had no opportunities of learning from authority higher than the Colonels, but that tells me that we can not be transferred to a different post if at a great distance

Johnson has just arrived in camp from
house, & tells me, that a part of the Legion
& Bollings Battalion, have left Montgom-
ery for Chattanooga. I have been to Gen^l
Withers once whilst at Tupelo to try &
get this company transferred to Killards
Legion at Montgomery. He said, that
it could not be done. I have very little hopes
of getting a transfer to Chattanooga, but
I can find out in a short time, whether
there be any chance. We may be ordered
to Chattanooga, during the unsettled state
of affairs, we may expect to march at
any time, in almost any direction.

Since Bragg has superseded Beauregard
there have been some alterations here.
We are now in Chalmers Brigade, Withers
Division. Our Division has been trans-
ferred to the reserve corps. We belong
to the army of the Mississippi. Gen
Bragg has assigned, Gen^l Hardee to
the command of this army.

I hear that John was beaten for 1st Lt.
I hope he has succeeded in getting
the second Lieutenantcy.

I cannot tell you much as to the position
I now hold. The two Alabama companies
in this Regt have been consolidated
and I have been recommended for

uniform of the cloth which Louisiana is
made. As soon as I am established
in a position I will write and send
on my measure.
