



Mar Knoxville Aug 27th 1862

Dear Father,

We reached this place 3 days ago. We were ordered to report to Gordon but on arriving there were sent on here; a great misfortune for us as we anticipated the pleasure of a visit to Nashville soon, that however is entirely out of our line of march now. - Tomorrow we leave for Maynardville 20 miles on the road to Cumberland Gap where there has been some skirmishing lately. We march without tents by order & without knapsacks from necessity. - we would be satisfied if only knapsacks were furnished. They were offered at Chattanooga but Col Morington & Bolling condemned them as unsuitable so we are to march without. Sanford's Batt. is equipped well in this respect. Not even Field officers are allowed tents and very little baggage. I send to day by express my own & Bros trunks, marked Bolling's. I argued with you & Bolling both that we would be forced to this but you both insisted on my bringing my trunk. Well I am getting off easy if I can get it safe at home. All hands are expressing home who have anything worth the trouble. Nearly every man has a trunk. We are allowed 3 four horse waggon. but ~~we~~ have to haul all our provision.
