Sir

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter 3rd inst containing twenty five (25) dollars amount due me as Commutation. You mentioned that you sent the amount last Summer before entering on your Kentucky Campaign. That amount I never received, had I received it, I would have acknowledged it immediately. I am sorry that you have lost that amount, I did not have any idea that you would ^{send} it consequently I did not expect it. I was home on furlough last month I had the pleasure of a short interview with Lieut Dunlap. He looked very well indeed, I was glad to see him. I presume the Dixies does not look at all like the old Company, there has been a great many deaths in the Company as I have been informed. I expect half the old original members are dead or discharged. Col. the news in this quarter is unimportant. Old Fort Morgan is just as you left it. There is always from ten (10) to fifteen (15) vessels in sight. It is a hard matter to run the blockade however some vessels run in occasionally. I am exceedingly gratified to learn of your promotion to a

position which you are so much entitled
to. I send you of your promotion previous to
the receipt of your letter, I have a very
good situation down here I will from the
first of next month receive a salary of eighty
\$0 dollars per month.
