Headquarters Wilcox's Old Brigade, In the Field, near Richmond, June 8th, 1864

Mr. Editor: Sir: Enclosed please find a list of casualties in "Wilcox's Old Brigade," during the engagement from the 6th to the 25th of May. You will please publish the same for the information of many anxious friends and relatives and oblige. Your obedient servant, W. E. Winn, A. A. G., Wilcox's Old Brigade.

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SOME OLD WAR RECORDS.

CASUALTIES OF AN ALABAMA REGIMENT AT CHANCELLORSVILLE.

A Terrible Record of Blood on May 3, 1863--Interesting Facts of the Old War Times.

We are indebted to Mr. D. M. Montgomery of Pleasant Ridge for a copy of the Richmond Sentinel, published in Richmond, Va., May 15, 1863, says the Eutaw Mirror. It was sent to Mr. Montgomery by Mr. Frank H. Cobb of Hudson, Mich., a gentleman who wore the blue. By some chance of war life Messrs. Montgomery and Cobb were thrown together for a time during the "unpleasantness" and became fast friends. Since then they have corresponded occasionally. In sending the paper Mr. Cobb writes:

"Dear Friend and Comrade: When in the army and in your front, I sent home numerous papers. Among them was one which I had got from some of your 11th Alabama boys, (the Richmond Sentinel), of the date of May 15, 1863, in which I find the casualties of the 11th Alabama at Chancellorsville, on May 3, 1863. It is a war relic and prized very highly by me, but I know very well the old boys of your regiment would prize it still more than I, and I will send it to you. I notice by your papers that the confederate veterans are to have a reunion on the 18th. I thought it would be interesting reading for the survivors of the 11th as well as many others who were at the front in '63. This paper is nearly worn out with being handled, which makes it the more valuable.

Remember me kindly to any of your comrades and many thanks for their kindness in the days that tried men's nerves."

There are a great many items of "news" in stained old paper that would be interesting, telegrams from battles, ships running blockades with cotton, positions and relative sizes of the armies, etc., but we will content ourselves for the present with giving a few items from the Richmond market report, as follows: Pork, \$1.35 per pound, for round hog; beans, \$18 to \$20 a bushel; butter, \$2.25 per pound; apple brandy, \$22 to \$4 per gallon; corn, \$3.50 to \$9 per bushel; meal, \$9; tallow candles, \$3.50 to \$5 per pound; cotton 50 to 55 cents per pound; coffee, \$4 to \$4.50 per pound; dried apples, \$11.50, peaches, \$16 per bushel; flour, \$31 to \$36 per barrel and barrels \$1 apiece; hay, \$10 to \$12 per 100 pounds; dry hides \$1.15 a pound; lard \$1.60 a pound; leather, \$3.50 to \$5.50 per pound; lime, \$10 per barrel; molasses \$10 to \$12 per gallon; oats, \$5.50 per bushel; potatoes, Irish, \$10, sweet \$11 per bushel; rice 22 cents; peas \$12 to \$16 per bushel; salt, 45 cents per pound; sugar, \$1.10 to \$1.85 a pound; tobacco 70 cents to \$2 a pound; wheat, \$6.50 to \$7 per bushel; whisky, \$22 to \$30 per gallon; wood \$22 to \$25 a cord, etc. Confederates state bonds were \$1.05 to \$1.95 for long and short dates.

HOW RUBE ESCAPED

Company "B" Eleventh Ala. Regt., C.S.A.



During the last days of May 1861 Co. "B" was organized at Eutaw Ala., and assumed the name of "Greene County Grays." The Officers and Non Commissioned officers were duly elected and the organization of the Company being complete, its services were tendered to the Confederate states for the term of three years or the war. The Company was assigned to the command of Col. Syd Moore who was engaged in raising a Regiment. On the 14th of June 1861 orders were received to repair to Lynchburg Va. with all possible haste for the purpose of regimental organization, & on the 17th bidding adieu to weeping friends, & relations, we tore ourselves from home, and turned our faces towards the distant theatre of war in old Virginia. We reached Lynchburg ~~mm~~ on the morning of the 26th of June and went into camp about one mile and a half from the city there to await the arrival of the other Companies which were to compose the regiment. In due time these arrived, and the regiment was duly organized, and mustered into service by Major H.L. Clay of the A & I.G.D. The "Greene County Grays" was here given the name of Co. "B" and took its appropriate position on the left of the Regt. which now took the name of the Eleventh Ala. Remained at Lynchburg until the 4th July; were ordered to Richmond where we arrived on the morning of the 5th and encamped on the Eastern outskirts of the city. Remaining at Richmond until the 10th of July Col. Moore was ordered to report to Genl. Joseph E. Johnston at Winchester Va., where we arrived about 9 o'clock on the night ~~mm~~ of the 13th the 1st Ala. Regt. was placed in the brigade Commanded by Genl. E. Kirby Smith. On the morning of the 18th we rec'd orders to cook three days rations, and be ready to march immediately, after due preparation we began the memorable forced march to Manassas to assist the army under Genl. Beauregard in repelling the enemy who were then confronting him with overwhelming numbers. We reached the Shenandoah River about 2 o'clock on the night of the 18th; there we encamped on the morning of the 19th resumed the march. Reached Piedmont Station on the Manassas Gap R.R., about 12 o'clock on the 19th. Here the Regt. remained C & B being on Picket, until the morning of the 22nd when taking passage on the cars we reached Manassas on the same day thereby missing the glorious opportunity of participating in the first great Battle of the war. We remained in this vicinity until the 8th March 1862 when we took up the line of march to Richmond. Here we were ordered to

Goldsboro, N.C. and had proceeded as far as Weldon N.C. where the order was countermanded by another to proceed immediately to Yorktown, where we arrived about the last of March and remained until the 4th ~~of~~ May 1862 at which time the army evacuated said place. Marched to Richmond and participated in all the battles around said city. Co.B. was on all the marches of the 1st and 2nd Maryland Campaigns and Winter Quartered at Orange C.H. the winter of 63 & 4. On the 5th of May 1864 we left our camps and marched to the Wilderness participated in all the engagements with Grants boastful Army from the Wilderness to Petersburg and around the City.

We are in Winter Quarters, about two and a half miles West of Petersburg.

P.S. - On the 20th of August /64 Co.B, was temporarily consolidated with Co "K" 11th Ala., on account of smallness of numbers. Capt. Clark comdg the Co. had been previously assigned to duty as A.A.G. of the Brigade & Lt. Schollpert the remaining comd. officer had been detailed 30/64 in command of Brigade pioneer corps. At the time of this consolidation only four men were remaining of Co. "B" in present connection with the Regt.

THE ELEVENTH ALABAMA INFANTRY.

The Eleventh Alabama infantry was organized at Lynchburg, Va., in 1861. It was distinguished at Seven Pines, May 31 to June 1, 1862, and at Frayser's Farm, June 30th, where it charged with bayonets across an open field. It was at Second Manassas, August 30, 1862; Harper's Ferry, Sharpsburg, Fredericksburg, and Salem, May 3, 1863; Gettysburg, July 1 to 3, 1863; The Wilderness, May 5 to 7, 1864; Spottsylvania, May 8th-18th; the Crater, July 30th; Burgess' Farm, October 27th; and in numerous battles around Petersburg, June, 1864, to the surrender at Appomattox. Among the killed in the battles of this regiment were the distinguished Col. Sydenham Moore, at Seven Pines; Lieut.-Col. Stephen H. Hale and Lieut. W. C. Faith, at Gaines' Mill; Capts. James H. McMath, Thomas H. Holcombe, Stephen E. Bell, W. C. Y. Parker, Wm. M. Bratton, and Lieuts. A. B. Cohen, T. J. Michie, and A. N. Steele, all at Frayser's Farm; Captains Cadell and Brazleton and Adj. R. Y. Ashe at Petersburg; Captain James at Cold Harbor; and Captain Harris at the Crater. Among the other field officers were Cols. John C. C. Sanders and George E. Tayloe, Maj. Archibald Gracie, Jr., afterward brigadier-general, killed; and Majs. Richard T. Fletcher and George Fields.

Vol. XI, Part 1—(407) Mentioned in report of General Magruder, Yorktown, April 5 to May 3, 1862. (580) Referred to in report of Col. M. D. Corse, Seven Pines. (591) Referred to in General Wilcox's report, Williamsburg. (941) Colonel Moore mentioned in General Longstreet's report of Seven Pines. (986-988) General Wilcox's report of battle of Seven Pines says: "The leading regiment, the Eleventh Alabama, Col. Sydenham Moore, of my brigade, was ordered to the front. . . . Colonel Moore with two companies dislodged the enemy, receiving two wounds, one of which proved mortal. . . . His loss is scarcely reparable. Lieut. Walter E. Winn, adjutant of



the Eleventh Alabama, was much distinguished for his zeal and courage. . . . Lieut.-Col. S. F. Hale of the Eleventh Alabama, though commanding the Ninth Alabama, was conspicuous for the skill with which he managed his regiment. Captains Tayloe and Holcombe were wounded in the first day's fight, the former seriously."

Vol. XI, Part 2—(486, 503) In Wilcox's brigade, Longstreet's division, Seven Days' battles. Casualties, 76 killed and 240 wounded. (773-779) General Wilcox, in his report of Gaines' Mill and Frayser's Farm, mentions Lieut.-Col. S. F. Hale as seriously, perhaps mortally, wounded; Lieut. W. C. Faith, killed; speaks most highly of Assistant-Surgeon Saunders and Lieut. Walter E. Winn, and gives a most graphic account of the glorious part taken by the regiment on June 30th, referring to Capt. J. H. McMath, S. E. Bell, T. H. Holcombe, W. M. Bratton and Lieut. A. B. Cohen, commanding companies; Lieuts. A. N. Steele and Michie mortally wounded; Capt. J. C. C. Sanders and W. C. Y. Parker severely wounded, also Lieuts. J. H. Prince and R. H. Gordon. (980) Casualties, 27 killed, 130 wounded, battle of Gaines' Mill; 49 killed, 121 wounded, at Glendale.
