The widge got on a rampage yesterday and played most fantastic tricks with the awnings in front of some of the stores up town.

The Victoria did not come up on regular time this week, being detained in Mobile waiting the visitors who were in attendance at the Agricultural Fair.

We noticed yesterday some of the most beautiful specimens of the fuchsia heliotrope and geraniums we have ever seen. They were in Dr. Kelley's window.

Why not add boating to the other recreations of the season? Almost every other town has its rowing club and for us we certainly can't complain of the want of water.

As mosquitoes will doubtless be quite plentiful this season we think we have an infallible plan for their extermination which we will give upon application—gratis.

A Rattle snake with three rattles was killed in our yard yesterday morning. He had doubtless refuged from the high water. Such things tell well in a local but we prefer not to have any more in ours.

Scarcely a day passes that we do not hear of the work of garden thieves, nearly every garden in town has been plundered. Some dork is going to get shot at this foolishness yet. If he does we promise him a first rate local and a warm locality.

**Circuit Court.**—The spring term opens at Linden next Monday. For the sake of our planting friends who are so far behind we hope the session will be brief. Few men can afford to leave their crops at this season.

There were two fire alarms the past week, one at the house occupied by Mr. M. D. Picard, the other at the residence of Rev. J. W. Phillips, both occasioned by burning chimneys. The fire company was on hand promptly on each occasion and the fires were extinguished without damage.

The weather for the last few days has been beautiful indeed, just suited to the growing crops and while the grass has got a good start on the farmer, yet with a continuance of the weather gauge at the present point he will rapidly overtake general green. A dry May for a good crop, year.

Our mail now comes only three times a week, Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays. Maj. Bridges, the Superintendent of the Alabama Central Railroad, thinks that it will be the 1st of June before we shall have through trains to Meridian, so great has been the damage, but we predict that Joe Gallion will have the entire track clear by the 20th inst., and not have to work on Sundays either.

Many of our gardeners and planters have complained of the great destruction brought by the grub and cut worms yet we were not aware of the numbers of insects infesting the ground until a day or two since. While walking in a certain portion of the overflooded district, from which the waters have begun to recede, we noticed the ground almost literally covered with the dead carcasses of the grub and cut worm which had been drowned out by the flood. It is possible that by the same agency the supply of the cotton moth has been materially diminished. We hope so at least.

**The Roost Flood.**—At Beckleys Landing in this county, the water is said to have been higher than in 1838. It reached the second story of the warehouse and stood more than a foot deep in the hall of the dwelling house. We regret to learn that all the negro cabins on General Poellnitz place were carried away. Two negroes were drowned on Mr. Gauss Whitefields place. Marengo has suffered as much, perhaps, as any other county on the river; yet there are still work and provisions for all.

Since our last issue a good deal of evidence has come to light going to prove that this flood is higher than that of 1838.

Our swollen waters are receding very slowly, and it will be several days before the high water is within her banks again. The plantations on the river are nearly all still submerged and we fear it will be too late to plant cotton, when they shall be relieved of the water now on them. The prospect for making a crop of cotton in the overflooded region is gloomy, and our planters should appropriate those lands to raising provisions. We fear the result of the overflow on the health of our people. We understand that the overflow of 1838 was followed by bowel complaints, and there are some cases of dysentery here now, which are attributed to that cause. Our Board of Health should be on the alert, and see that fifth deposits, and other sources of unhealthfulness are removed and do all in their power to prevent sickness.

**A Cemetery.**—Our people need a cemetery, and we are surprised that they have overlooked this want so long.

Our dead have found a resting place in the private burying grounds of the late Allen Glover deceased, and their surviving friends have been indebted to their kindness for the privilege.

The recent overflow has demonstrated that the burying place above referred to is not suitable for a cemetery, as it was nearly entirely submerged for several days. This mournful spectacle has roused our citizens to the necessity of procuring a suitable place, and we are gratified to hear they have taken steps in that direction, and hope their efforts may be crowned with success, and that they will not halt till their object is attained.

Speaking of insects we are reminded to say a word in favor of the birds. It is well known that in this regard they are our natural allies and protectors against the various forms of insect life at once so abundant and annoying and destructive in this climate. There are in our towns scores of hundreds of little boys of all colors and both sexes who have begun bird nesting with as much avidity as a negro commences operations in "possum hollow" after the first frost.

We saw this morning a tom tit's nest plundered, the mother bird killed and five beautiful nestlings ruthlessly thrown out to die by a juvenile party of downy berry hucksters. Is there no chance to put a stop to such things? The mocking bird is the pride of the south. Within six weeks five hundred young ones will be captured and caged in this town. Not a half dozen of all this number will survive. This wanton destruction should be arrested.
