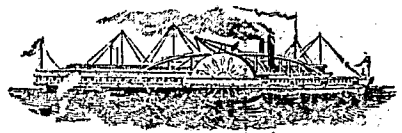

BY TELEGRAPH.

Reported by the Associated Press for the Montgomery Daily Advertiser.

WASHINGTON, June 3.

When the Senate went into executive session last evening, a unanimous report was made from the Committee on Finance recommending the confirmation of Gen. Briscoe to be Secretary of the Treasury in place of Richardson. The Senate without hesitating unanimously confirmed the nomination, not so, however, with Richardson to be a Judge of the Court of Claims, which was not reported back unanimously from the Committee of Judiciary. During the forty minutes session the views interchanged by the Senators were rather in conventional way than by debate. The Democrats openly basing their opposition to the nominee on those parts of the report of the Committee on Ways and Means, and the accompanying testimony in the Sanborn case having reference to him. With this exception no question arose as his fitness for the judgeship. But little was said on the Republican side; certainly no formal motion to reject. The Democrats, however, did so to carry the confirmation by a small majority. If those who opposed the nomination by failing to respond to their names had voted a negative the nomination would have been rejected. The Senator had been canvassed by a senatorial friend of Richardson a week before his nomination was transmitted to the Senate, when it appeared that the confirmation could be secured, though not by a large majority, Massachusetts has now two judges on the bench of the Court of Claims, Loring and Richardson.

DETROIT, June 3.

The American Medical Association commenced its annual session to-day. Large numbers are present. Dr. Fisher of Washington, the President, made an address interesting particularly to the profession. Resolution was adopted calling on Congress to establish a sanitary bureau.

PARIS, June 3.

It is reported on good authority that Serrano will soon be granted a general pardon in Spain and if the Monarchists are in the majority he will propose enhancement of the prince of Asturias under his own regency.

CINCINNATI, June 3.

At Nicholasville, Ky., yesterday Harding H. Masters was shot and killed by W. H. Soper, son of J. H. Soper about noon. Another tragedy occurred about twelve miles south of Nicholasville, (Granville Smith, aged 60, killed his nephew, Wm. Hughes, and then shot himself. Smith is mortally wounded.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., June 3.

Compositors in Courier office struck work to-day because the proprietor refused to discharge a compositor who would not pay assessment to send a delegate to the National Typographical Union at St. Louis.

CHICAGO, June 3.

Brakemen on the C. & O. R. R. are on a strike. Blooming men have been sent to supply their places.

ST. LOUIS, June 3.

In the Presbyterian General Assembly, Mr. Breckenridge, of the committee appointed to consider the expediency of a committee from this Assembly conferring with the Southern Assembly, reported that, owing to the action of that Assembly nothing remained to be done.

HAVANA, June 3.

The payment of foreign postage in specie has been required since yesterday.

PARIS, June 3.

The debate on the electoral bill will be continued to-morrow, when Ledru Rollins will speak against the measure. Brisson, in his speech on the bill, said it would lead to a resolution on a plebiscite.
Gambetta, at Auxerre, to-day denounced the plebiscite as a false principle and doing homage to National sovereignty; all citizens should demand an appeal to the people by means of the general elections; this was the vital question.

PHILADELPHIA, June 3.

The Reformed Presbyterian Synod adopted a series of Resolutions that

the constitutional recognition of Jesus Christ, the mediator between God and man as the Legislative Head and Ruler of Nations, is an indispensable duty of the nation.

LONDON, June 3.

A dispatch from San Sebastian, reports the town has been attacked by the Carlists in force, and is in a critical condition. Men of War have been sent to protect the foreign residents. Reinforcements for the Garrison are hastening from the interior.
