



BY TELEGRAPH.

BELOIT, Wis., June 9.

The spire of the Presbyterian church was demolished and the Congregational church badly shattered. Other buildings are also damaged.

LONDON, June 9.

The Times correspondent at Paris telegraphs that it is expected that DuFour in a few days will ask the Committee on Constitutional Laws to come to a vote on the first article of a bill introduced Nov. 13th, providing that the Government shall consist of a Senate Chamber of Representatives and President of the Republic.

If the committee rejects the article the Left Centre will move the Assembly to refer a similar proposition to a new commission. Should this fall the Left Centre as a last resort will move the dissolution of the Assembly. In the event of any adverse votes the deputies belonging to all sections of the Left may possibly resign en masse. A correspondent of the Times, in a letter to that journal from Victoria, Spain, says that Marshal Canova is moving against the Carlists in Navarre with every available means. The Carlist party, in command of the Carlists, is already in good position. An important action is expected to take place soon.

HAVANA, June 9.

Small-pox is raging in Jamaica and vessels from that island are quarantined.

PORTSMOUTH, June 9.

The cable steamer Tarradilly is in port. She is 4800 tons burthen, the largest ever in these waters. Festivities rule the day, aboard and ashore. The cable is buoyed within ten miles of the shore by a deep sea cable very strong but light, the size of a mile, shore endings two and a half inches diameter, weighing 18 tons to the mile.

PARIS, June 9.

Archbishop Landrist of Rheims is dead.

CITY OF MEXICO, June 2.

Local customs duties imposed on goods going from one city to another within the territory of Mexico are to be abolished.

All the parties implicated in the burning of alleged sorcerers in Jacobo are in prison. Four were arrested by the police and the others surrendered themselves. None of them can read except one, who is the village schoolmaster, who says the outrage would not have been perpetrated had not the Prefect sent orders to hurry the execution.

WICKESBURG, June 9.

Last night an explosion occurred in the shaft of the Natick mine, burning 3 miners and setting fire to the breaker, which was soon destroyed. While fighting the flames some burning timbers fell upon Mr. Vivian, killing him instantly. Alex. Ale, Chas. Keller, Hawley Walsh, Tom Ewell, Tom McManus, Henry Berne, Snyder, and Lorenzo Krebs, of the gang who were also engaged in fighting the fire, were overcome by the gas, and had to be carried from the mine. The first 2 were insensible when brought to the fresh air, and have since died. The others are doing well.

WASHINGTON, June 9.

In the Senate Allison from the District of Columbia in investigating Committee reported a bill for the Government of the District which was placed on the calendar.

In the House the votes on the Louisiana election case, were as follows: 1st that Pinchback is entitled to the seat "prima facie" which was lost without a division; 2d that Sheridan was elected which was also lost 71 to 145; 3d that Pinchback was not elected, lost 9 to 121 and 4th that for the testimony does not show that either was elected and that they may take further testimony which was carried without a division.
