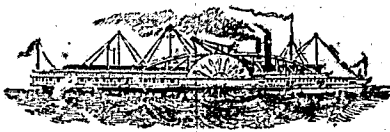

BY TELEGRAPH.

Reported by the Associated Press for the Montgomery Daily Advertiser.

PARIS, June 16.

The Assembly is crowded with Deputies and spectators. Casimir Perier introduced the Constitutional bill prepared by the Left Centre and moved that its consideration be declared urgent. He said the country demanded a termination of the provisional state. He urged union against the Bonapartists and disorder. The Speaker was frequently interrupted by the Right and warmly applauded by the Left. Laboulaye supported the motion for urgency. He said that recent events have shown the dangers of provisional condition. Monarchy was impossible; empire would only lead to the invasion and oppression of France. A republic was a Government of all for all, and establishment would inspire the country with confidence. Gen. Reclamier of the Right Centre and M. Raoul Duval of the Right, opposed the motion. M. DeKadrel of the Right warned members that if the majority of the Assembly were changed, Marshal MacMahon might consider it his duty to resign the Presidency.

Vote was then taken on the motion for urgency, and it was agreed to—yeas 345, nays 341. All the Ministers voted against it, in their capacity as members of the Assembly only. The motion will not be made a Cabinet question. Urgency having been declared, the bill was referred to a committee of thirty.

M. de la Rochefoucauld, Duc de Bisaccia, of the extreme Right, then introduced a resolution in substance as follows, which was read amid profound silence: The Assembly declares that the Government of France is a monarchy; its throne belongs to the House of France; Marshal MacMahon may assume the title of Lieutenant of the Kingdom, and national institutions shall be determined by agreement between the King and the National Representatives.

Great excitement followed the reading of the resolution. Rochefoucauld moved it to be referred to the committee of thirty. The motion was rejected by a majority of two. The ministers, with the exception of M. Tailhand, voted against it. It is stated that Rochefoucauld resigned his position as Ambassador to Great Britain before introducing the resolution.

The Bonapartists deputies held a conference before to-day's sitting and came to the conclusion that it would be of no use to introduce any counter motion against the Left Centre.

20 Members of the Right Centre abstained from voting on Cassimere Berrier's motion for urgency on the Left Centre constitutional bill.

PHILADELPHIA, June 16.
The Board of Trade passed a resolution opposing any further issue of irredeemable currency and approving the President's course in vetoing the financial bill.

MADRID, June 15.
Rumors of the evacuation of Estella by the Basques are not confirmed. Gen. Concha is preparing to attack the town immediately at three different points.

WASHINGTON, June 16.
The Senate passed the House bill to authorize the Secretary of the Treasury to suspend work on the public buildings.

The Arkansas contested election cases, Wilshire, the sitting member, was unseated and Gunter sworn in and the committee was discharged from the consideration of the case of Bradley against Hyn.

The House passed the bill making bigamy and polygamy a ground of ineligibility of the Territorial delegates. The Judiciary Committee at the meeting this morning took no action on the Husted and Judge Durell's case—Judge Story has resigned.
