

BY TELEGRAPH.

Reported by the Associated Press for the Montgomery Daily Advertiser.

PARIS, June 19.

In the Assembly to-day the clause in the municipal organization bill, giving to large taxpayers the right of membership in the Municipal Councils, was rejected—ayes 325, nays 373. The Left, the Bonapartists, and a portion of the Right Centre, voted with the majority. They regarded the clause as an attempt to give the vote to the wealthy.

The announcement of the vote created considerable sensation.

M. Farvett, Minister of the Interior, expressed his willingness to accept as a compromise a limitation of the Government's right to appoint Mayors of the city.

M. Paul de Cassagnac is cited to appear before the Assize Court on Monday next to answer the charge of inciting citizens to hatred of each other. The American naval squadron in the Mediterranean is expected at Toulon shortly to be reviewed.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.

The Steamer Vancouver and Lord of the Isles from China, arrived at this evening. The Lord of Isles brings 645 Chinese passengers, and the Vancouver 612. The latest Chinese papers state that the vessel lost in the China seas with all on board, was the steamer Scotland, not the Bark Scotland from this port as was supposed.

TOLEDO, June 19.

Barrow's factory boiler exploded. It killed two and hurt several.

LONDON, June 19.

Rochefort reached this city last evening. His arrival at the Baston station, was unattended by any demonstration.

ROME, June 19.

Cardinal Antonelli is suffering from a severe attack of the gout and is very weak.

At the reception of the Cardinals by the Pope on Tuesday, His Holiness mentioned that proposals had been received from exiled political personages, looking to a reconciliation between the Papacy and the Italian Government. He declared, however, he would yield nothing, and that any concession on his part would be injurious to the church and society.

WASHINGTON, June 19.

The President settled the vexed question of the Internal Supervisors for the Southern District, composed of the States of Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, deciding that Hon. K. R. Cobb shall retain the position.

Senate.—Clayton from the Joint Select Committee, reported a resolution authorizing that Committee to sit during the recess of Congress, for the purpose of investigating as to the condition of the levees of the Mississippi river, and the property of the Government of the United States assuming control of the same, laid over.

The House passed a bill fixing \$250,000 as the limit of expenditures for the erection of the custom house at Atlanta, Ga.
