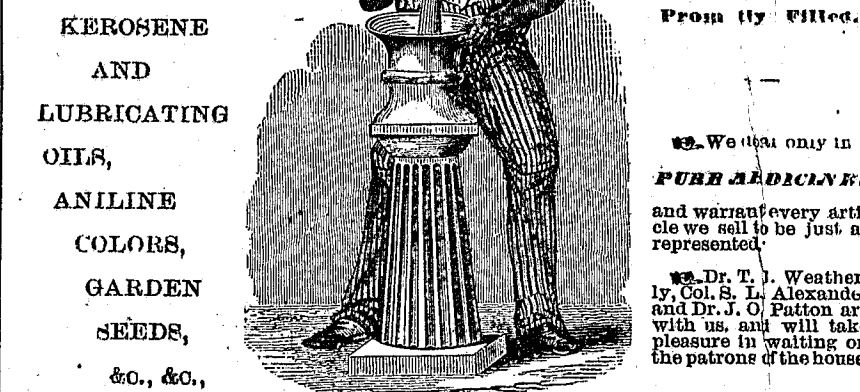

**WASHINGTON, June 22.**

The Senate, at Saturday night session, passed a bill granting the right of way through the public lands to construct and maintain a railroad on the States of Alabama and Florida.

Committee on public buildings reported favorably upon their erection at Atlanta. Quarter million appropriation passed.

To enable the Secretary of War to carry out provisions of act of April 23d, 1874, for relief of persons suffering from overflow of lower Mississippi river, and joint resolution authorizing the issue of army rations and clothing to destitute people on the Tombigbee, Warrior and Alabama rivers, five hundred thousand dollars were appropriated. This is amendment to sundry civil appropriations. Alcorn submitted an amendment to the bill to restore the Mississippi river to its former channel.

Mr. Anthony, from the Committee on Printing, reported back the letter of Rives & Bailey, making charges of false statement against the printer Clapp, with a written report, and asked that the committee be discharged from further consideration of the subject. So ordered. He said the committee had unanimously acquitted Clapp of all charges, and found nothing whatever in the evidence against his integrity.

Windom submitted an amendment to the River and Harbor bill, appropriating \$200,000 for surveys and estimates for the improvement of the North Carolina, from \$100,000 to \$200,000. Agreed to.

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Clerks were engaged yesterday, enrolling numerous bills and otherwise transacting business pertaining to Congress. During yesterday about fifty bills mostly of a private character were printed to the President for approval.

Committee of Conference on Geneva award distribution bill have not yet been able to agree and probably it will go over till next session with many others of a public character. It is remarked by persons long observers of closing scenes of Congress, that the recent night sessions though somewhat noisy were less disorderly than heretofore toward the end of the session.

Copious supplies of lemonade and iced tea were furnished in the ante rooms. With the closing hours of Congress the determination and energy of the lobby grew stronger. Old and familiar faces are seen at the doors in earnest renewals of appeals to the Congressmen to make final efforts in behalf of their claims for the last time. The lobby lobbies are not in great number but they are the most important. Many of the Congressmen leave Washington in the earliest trains after the adjournment. A few of them have left. The currency bill has reached the President, and the general opinion is that he will sign it.

The President with members of the Cabinet was at the Capital Saturday attending to business and will be there to-day. The Senate will have an Executive session before adjournment to dispose of pending nominations.

Immediately on meeting of Senate to-day, Frelinghuysen will call up the House bill for the execution of Federal laws in Utah, in effect abolishing the office of the Territorial judiciary as interfere with their enforcement. This together with Ramsey's post route bill will probably be passed with but little discussion.

New York, June 22. A number of bondholders of Selma, Marion and Memphis Railroad assembled Saturday in Wall street. The object of the meeting was to free the line from the two liens, one endorsed by the State of Alabama in 1869 and the other made in 1871 in order that the bonds might become negotiable. White, the President proposed a resolution that the old bonds be surrendered and new ones be issued which together with subscriptions promised by Selma county, Tennessee, and other districts would enable the directors to complete and make it a paying concern. Motion was carried. A Committee was appointed to notify bondholders of the determination arrived at and to obtain their consent thereto.

To-day being the 28th anniversary of the accession the Pope to the papacy, after the celebration of ordinary morning services in Roman Catholic churches throughout the city special prayers were offered for his future prosperity and welfare.

LONDON, June 21. The Observer publishes the text of the Home Rule resolve, which Dr. Isaac Butt, member of Parliament for Sligo, proposes to move on the 30th inst. in the House of Commons. It is in substance as follows: That in the opinion of the House it is expedient that to restore to the Irish nation the power of managing exclusively Irish affairs in an Irish Parliament, provision being made at the same time for maintaining the integrity of the Empire by leaving to the Imperial Parliament the control of imperial affairs.

HAVANA, June 21. An immense water spout formed in the harbor to-day and passed through the shipping, causing considerable damage. The spout was several miles in length and several small boats sunk; no lives lost. Men of war fired blank cartridges, which had the effect of dissolving the column of water.

Conference was held at the Captain General's Palace this morning, all the generals in the city and chief officers and volunteers.

Havana journals exhort inhabitants to throw off their lethargy and do something to save the island from financial ruin before too late.

PARIS, June 22. Latest advices from Spain state that the frontier town, Figueras, in Genoa, is closely invested by the Carlist Chieftain, Sabido.

Mr. Zola, who was sent from Germany to Spain with an offer of a loan to be guaranteed by a mortgage upon Philippine Islands, has fallen in his mission, and will return to Berlin.

Telegraphic communication between France and Spain has been severed.

WASHINGTON, June 22, 1874. The President has signed the new Currency bill. It fixes circulation at \$882,000,000 and unlocks the reserves that the banks are required to keep in their vaults.

Senate—Passed the tariff bill with amendments recommended by the committee.

The House has agreed to the report of the Conference Committee on the Geneva award bill.

ROME, June 21. The Pope in reply to a deputation yesterday said he was confident that God would restore the crown, if not to him because he was too old and might not live to see the day, then to his successors.

NEW YORK, June 22. The Times publishes a communication from Congressman Cain denouncing the charges lately made against him in a letter from Charleston, printed in that journal, and asserting that the party upon whose authority the statements were made was prompted by malice.

A New Orleans dispatch says Deputy Sheriff Dick, at 12 o'clock yesterday, made a final demand upon Badger for the form of the *Judith*, and was told that they were at his disposal. The police authorities found that there was no possible excuse for the outrage they had perpetrated and yielded.

Advised from Nevada that a fight occurred there lately between a party of American sailors and French soldiers, in which one of the former was killed and others imprisoned. The Police raided on Paul Folkes Theatre last night, and arrested all actors and actresses and lodged them in the Police Station. The audience departed without molestation.
