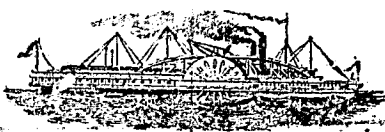

BOYONNE, April 6.

Active operations front of Bilbao were resumed on the 3d inst, with Bombardment of Abanto by Republican forces. Previous to that date there had been no fighting for 25 or 30 days. Serrano is re-organizing his forces and the Carlists are doing everything to strengthen their position. Genl Gristany is reported to have surprised and captured one hundred Republican near Calor, 147 miles from Barcelona. The surprise was so complete that the Republicans surrendered without fighting.

PARIS April 6.

Charles Ernest Bull, a distinguished classical scholar and member of the Assembly, is dead.

LONDON, April 2.

Ship Victoria Nyanza has been wrecked near Bolognese. Three men drowned.

NEW YORK, April 6.

During an altercation which took place last night at his residence, No. 27, Thompson St. Richard Heckton, aged 18, was stabbed in the left side by his brother John, and mortally wounded. The wounded man stated to the coroner, who was called at his brother's residence, that he was himself had been the aggressor.

The Pacific Manufacturing Company yesterday decided to contract for new iron steamers for the Pacific trade, or more of which will be built at Chester, Pa.

WASHINGTON, April 6.

A counter petition from South Carolina Radicals has been sent here to present to the President and members of Congress. They, of course, make out a case of good government, and that everything is lovely.

The annual meeting of the friends of the American Tract Society was held in the First Presbyterian Church this evening. Associate Justice Strong, of the United States Supreme Court, President of the Society, presided. Secretaries Rand and Shearer read reports of the Society's work. Mr. John E. Vassar, Gen. Gordon of Georgia, and Dr. Rankin delivered addresses. The receipts for the year were \$508,029; expenditures, \$504,710. The donations and legacies were \$118,578. The benevolent expenditures exceeded the receipts about \$10,000.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.

The great 20 mile trotting match Saturday afternoon at Oakland, be-

tween Haywood and John Stewart, was won by the latter in 59 minutes and 3 seconds. Haywood was almost neck and neck with Stewart at the close. During most of the race Haywood was ahead from 6 to 10 lengths, but was finally beaten.

LONDON, April 6.

Professor Goldwin Smith has a long letter in the News on Home Rule. He advocates the general improvement of local institutions, and giving to them legislative powers for the administration of local affairs, similar to those of the legislatures of American States.

ELMIRA, APRIL 6.

A colored man, Charles Smith, was shot dead in this city this p. m. by another colored man, George Boyat, in a drunken quarrel. Smith drew a knife upon Boyat when the latter shot him with a pistol. Boyat gave himself up.

NEW YORK, April 6.

In consequence of disclosures, Tweed, instead of occupying a convict's cell in Blackwell's Island Penitentiary, is in possession of a comfortable room in the centre building of the institution, fitted up for his comfort. From purely human reasons, it became a question with the authorities as to whether or not some relaxation, of prison discipline in his case was not necessary, as an absolute necessity of health. Tweed was extraordinarily corpulent, and to enable him to move about with any degree of comfort, he was obliged to have his body bound up tight in clothes. Already in ill health, his sentence had a crushing effect upon his nervous system, and his condition at present is really pitiable. No prisoner in the penitentiary living in the ordinary ones. In fact if strict discipline was enforced in his case his sentence to imprisonment in the penitentiary would be equivalent to a sentence of death.

NEW YORK, April 6.

The steamship Zebebe from San Domingo 30th ult., brings the following news: British Consul General of Port Au Prince had been on a tour of Samana Bay and had afterwards visited Santa Domingo with a proposition from the Haytian Government for a treaty between the two Republics.

House--Under the call of States a large number of bills were introduced and referred.

In the Senate John Stow of Virginia introduced a bill, giving jurisdiction to the Court of Claims to hear the claim of G. W. Cusick Lee to the Arlington estate. Referred to the Judiciary committee.

Mail from Rio Janeiro, state that the Bishop of Pernambuco was attended during his trial by the Bishop of Kansas. Six of the court was in favor of condemning him to four years imprisonment at hard labor, one stood for lighter punishment, and one for acquittal. He is expressed that the Emperor will commute his sentence to banishment.
