The mismanagement and corruption which have marked the conduct of our county affairs during the last five years (as revealed by the report of the Grand Jury), caused much excitement and indignation in the city yesterday, and a movement was put on foot to employ competent counsel to prosecute the officials against whom indictments were preferred, and otherwise to protect the imperilled interests of the tax-payers.

We have been favored with a programme of the "First Fair of the Agricultural, Mechanical and Horticultural Association of Mobile," to commence Tuesday, May 5th, and continue for five days. As no entry fee is to be charged, and as the arrangements have been made on a liberal scale, a fair measure of success may be predicted. The officers of the Association are: Hon. C. C. Langdon, President; Wm. Cottrill, First Vice President; W. H. Kelly, Sec. Second Vice President; Isaac Dwyer, Third Vice President; Wm. B. Mickle, Secretary and Treasurer. This Fair will be a good one, and our citizens will have a fine opportunity of then visiting the Gulf City in the most pleasant season of the year.

It will be remembered that the Grand Jury, on Friday, reported Jas. Fitzpatrick, who is County Superintendent of Education, County Commissioner, member of the Board of Equalization, City Alderman and Superintendent of Public Works, for obtaining money under false pretences, and at the same time returned into court an indictment against him for the same offence.
