GRANGERS' COLUMN.

COUNTY COUNCIL.

Under a resolution of the Capital City Grange, the different Granges in Montgomery county are requested to send delegates to meet in the city of Montgomery, on the last Tuesday in this month, being the 24th inst., for the purpose of forming a County Council. Cocoa Valley Grange.

Pursuant to previous notice, and an invitation by Cocoa Valley Grange No. 118, to Granges throughout the county of St. Clair, a meeting was organized in Grange Room of Cocoa Valley Grange by calling Hon. E. J. Robinson to the chair and S. P. McClellan to act as Secretary. A call was made for Representatives to enroll their names as members of the meeting and in response the following names were taken: Cocoa Valley Grange, S. P. McClellan, G. P. Keyes, Hon. E. J. Robinson, Abe Cox and M. H. Zellner, Springfield Grange, A. Allen Reavis and C. Moorey, Cox Grange, John Fletcher and Silas Risher, Broken Arrow Grange, H. Box, C. Payne and E. E. Wyatt.

The objects of the meeting being explained a motion prevailed that a committee be appointed to draft resolutions more fully expressive of the sense of this meeting, and present the same for adoption. When the chair appointed S. P. McClellan, M. H. Zellner and J. W. Laney on this committee. By motion of S. P. McClellan, P. D. Dilley was added as requested to act as chairman. Committee retired and after a brief deliberation reported the following resolutions which were adopted:

Resolved, 1. That it is the duty of Patrons of Husbandry not to take into consideration, alone, the benefits arising pecuniarily from being a member of said order, but they should have a higher and more noble aim—that of educating the rising generation of Farmers, to fit them for any station in life.

Resolved, 2. In order to aid and assist in this education, we do recommend to our farmers, generally, both in and out of the county, to report for some good agricultural and political paper, that our children may have the advantage of reading something on the subject of each, every week, and that we ourselves may be benefited in the information we may gather from a good agricultural paper, and that also from a political paper, which enables us to understand our situation politically.

Resolved, 3. That we deprecate the practice of employing hands without first ascertaining whether they have married or contracted with any other party, and will do all in our power to suppress the same.

Resolved, 4. That it is our duty, as patrons, looking to the interest and good of the county, to cultivate more small grains, go back to the old land marks of raising more hogs and hominy, and let cotton be a surplus crop, and that we will urge our neighbors and friends to adopt this system.

Resolved, 5. That it is our duty to inform our wives and children of our pecuniary condition, so that they may fully understand our situation.

Resolved, 6. That we cannot ask our wives and daughters to more economy in the future than they have done in the past. Knowing that they are the same wives and daughters, descendants of the same wives that passed through the trying times from 61 to 65 we feel assured that if we make them acquainted with our condition they will know much better than otherwise how to adopt a system of saving economy.

A motion prevailed to tender the thanks of the fraternity to the Editor of the Southern Eagle for his courtesy in tendering a column of valuable paper to Patrons, for bringing before the people such matters as they may desire published.

By motion it was requested that these proceedings be published in the Southern Eagle.

Meeting adjourned to meet as stated, Feb. 24th, 1874, at Broken Arrow. S. P. McClellan, Secretary.

And Still They Come.

As a general thing, the farmers in this section are as busy as bees; a majority of them having secured as much labor as they need. It is now to be hoped that they will so shape the crop for this year, as to find a balance in their favor. In order to do this, there must be a change in the program, so far as it relates to cotton. Then let the farmers see to the fact that their farms are self-sustaining, so far as corn is concerned. The present prices of cotton should convince the most obstinate farmer that it will not pay him to raise cotton and buy corn. If cotton can raise corn at 25 cents per bushel, any 40 bushels per acre, we can most assuredly raise it at \$1 per bushel when we can, at the least calculation, raise it from 12 to 15 bushels per acre.—Chocoma Herald.
