Now, therefore, be it known that I, ULYSSES S. GRANT, President of the United States of America, have caused to be printed in duplicate, and every clause and article thereof, may be observed and fulfilled with good faith by the United States and the citizens thereof.

Done at the city of Washington this thirtieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the ninety-eighth.

JOINT RESOLUTION explanatory of resolution approved January 31, 1873, entitled "A resolution limiting the power of the President to suspend the writ of *habeas corpus*."

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President of the United States be and he is authorized to suspend the writ of *habeas corpus* in any case where the public safety may require it, and to make such regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this resolution.

Approved, March 24, 1874.

AN ACT changing the times for holding certain district courts of the United States, for the State of Iowa.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the times for holding the district courts of the United States for the State of Iowa be changed as follows: To wit: The district court for the district of Iowa, to be held in the city of Keokuk, on the first Monday of January, and the first Tuesday of February, and the first Tuesday of June, and at Council Bluffs on the fourth Monday of September, in each year.

AN ACT to establish certain post routes in the State of Arkansas.
