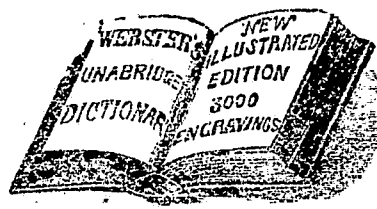

Cottons are offered to be delivered in June and July next, at prices equivalent to twelve cents for Low Middlings. Deduct five to ten dollars per bale, to get your cotton to market, and what are the proceeds per pound to you. Can you, under the present system of cotton raising, pay expenses at \$40 to \$50 per bale. Consider these facts and act like men. Plant less cotton; more corn, more peas, more turnips, more of everything that goes to feed man and beast, and let your cotton be the least of all crops.

Since the days of our earliest boyhood, we have ever been an ardent admirer of what we call the noble and beautiful in God's nature, and whatever is true and wonderful in man's art. The towering mountain, battling its hoary head in the blue ether of the sublime empire of the sky, the thundering cataract perpetually chanting its grand diapason of waters, the peerless dew-drop scintillating in lovely prismatic colors, "the lily of the field which toils not, neither does it spin," and those glorious stars with which light bespangles her sable curtain, and which the poet of the Bible, thousands of years ago, saw happily "gliding together" in their far-off heavenly home, these and other illustrations of divine handiwork have not unfrequently inspired us with emotions either of the most profound awe or the most ecstatic pleasure. And while the works and achievements of the creature, who is finite, cannot be compared with those of the Creator, who is infinite, yet man, and when we say "man," we, of course, include woman, "the nobler of the twin," has by the successful execution of splendid did conceptions of genius, in the sphere of art and science, often rendered himself the object of our wonder, veneration, and gratitude, as well as his accomplishments the sources of our high admiration and the occasion of our enthusiastic plaudits. In no arena, has he succeeded better in producing this effect, than in the Art of Painting. This copying from nature, this production upon canvas of a likeness of the body, the shadow of the substance, the counterpart of the real, in such truthful outlines and proportions as to be a easy recognition, is the very essence of art, and has, without sacrifice or presumption, been dubbed with the *soubriquet*, "The Living Art." In imagination, pass in review the finer and more delicate details of the human mind and hand, and what more floods the heart with a holy influence like unto an heavenly anction, what more enhances man's admiration and estimate of his kind than a well executed portrait, a picture, indeed, faithfully representing the well-membered lineaments, expression, and form of a friend, whom we loved and respected in life, and who, alas! now that he is no more, we shall ever cherish in fond and grateful recollection!

"But, lately his cheek with life's crimson was flushed, His voice was cheerful, health sat on his brow; That cheek is now pallid, that voice now hushed— He sleeps with the bones of his ancestors now!"

The foregoing reflections have been occasioned by the recent exhibition in the drug store, of Mr. Joseph Hurd, in Prattville, of an excellent crayon portrait of late Richard Brown, who died a few weeks ago, at his residence, near this place. As it is a specimen of which any connoisseur should be proud, we feel confident that no amateur will be required for stating, that this highly meritorious artistic production is a creation of the mind and hand of Miss Mattie Coleman, one of Autauga's fairest and most accomplished daughters. We had seen other pictures, scenes, and designs from her skillful pencil, which themselves indicated the possession of unusual talent, but we were not prepared for being confronted with such a remarkably faithful likeness of our deceased friend Richard, who sleeps in the cold clay of Ind's soil. There are those some pleasant and mildly speaking eyes, meaning kindness, love, and sympathy for the whole human family, and peace and "good will toward men." There is that same brow which was so often the throne of thought and sober reflection. The same hair rests on that head in unruffled smoothness, as was its wont when his heart pulsated in honest throbs, in his bosom below. Aye, there the cheeks the nose, mouth, and chin, and other features which constituted the facial physiognomy of the living man—a citizen, neighbor, and friend, who in every relation, while he had to sustain, was an honest man, and to be such, according to Shakespeare, is to be "one man picked out of ten thousand."

We cannot too highly commend the judgment and taste of the fair artist in the selection of the subject and in the execution of the picture. She selected an honest man, "the noblest work of God," as an object upon which to test her proficiency in art, and nobly has she performed her work. The light of the ancient philosopher, who went about looking for such a character, would have pale in the presence of the noble deceased, Richard Brown. We believe that he was a native of our county. In it, we are personally

cognizant of the fact, he passed the greater portion of his guiltless and useful life. He was a farmer by occupation, and earned an honest living, by daily toil, either in the heat of summer or the cold of winter. During the war he lost an arm in the service of "the conquered Center," but this did not prevent him from achieving wonders with the axe, and plow in the field and wood. About a year ago, he intermarried with Miss Callie Geocsen, an highly estimable young lady of this county, and now she is left a widow. I had to mourn the death of her loved and lost. May He, "who tempers the wind to the shoemaker," bind up her broken heart, and give her that consolation which is salvation to his will alone can impart!

Richard Brown was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Christian's course in this vale of tears, found in his blameless existence a bright and beautiful illustration. In all our observation of men and human actions, we never knew a better, purer, nobler, or more unselfish man. Over his humble grave, in the quiet country churchyard where his honored remains lie entombed, there should arise a monument of pure marble, to symbolize the purity of his life and character, and upon its unsullied surface should be engraved these truthful lines:

"Under this stone doth lie As much virtue as could die."
