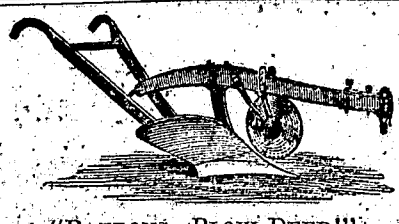

Does Pike county intend to be the last to organize a Council of the Patrons of Husbandry? Where are all the ambitious Grangers, that no one wants to be Master of a Council?

The Ozark Star says: We are pleased to learn that the Order of the Patrons of Husbandry in this county is flourishing. Almost every mail brings tidings of the increasing interest. We say to our friends, go on, and wish you God speed in the good work.

The Grangers of Russell County recently held a Convention at Seale, which was largely attended. Addresses were delivered by Col. W. H. Chambers, Master of State Grange, Major A. R. Calhoun of the Columbus Star-Enquirer, and Walter S. Gordon, Esq., District Deputy. A Russell County Council was organized.

The National Grange of the Patrons of Husbandry held its regular annual session in St. Louis, last week, but we have not yet seen a full report of the proceedings. It is telegraphed that an appropriation of \$3,000 was made to the State Grange of Iowa, in consideration of the great expense incurred by that Grange in relieving the wants of the distressed brethren in Iowa. An appropriation of \$1,000 to Minnesota and \$750 to Dakota, was also made. We shall give a full report of proceedings in our next issue.

#### Home Made Fertilizers.

Although the Columbus Enquirer states that the orders from dealers in this section for Soluble Pacific Guano are greater than last year, we believe the farmers hereabouts are preparing to make their own fertilizers, as a means of economy, and because they are convinced that this course is more profitable in the end. In view of this fact, Dr. A. St. Clair Tennille, of this city, has issued the following circular, and is prepared to sell the chemicals mentioned, at a low price. He says:

DIRECTIONS FOR MIXING.—Dissolve the Salts in the smallest quantity of water possible, and of the solution mixed with 6 barrels or 1,300 lbs. of swamp muck or any rich earth or well rotted compost. Then add and mix the Ground Bones, and last, the Land Plaster. This will make one ton, and if passed through a screen it will be more thoroughly mixed. Ashes, stable manure, or cotton seed can be mixed with this compound in any proportion, with advantage. One to two barrels may be used per acre.
