













## Another Brutal Outrage.

On Tuesday night last a negro man called at the store of Mr. James Wright, about ten miles north of this city on the river road, and called for a piece of tobacco. Mr. Wright was in the act of closing the store for the night and going to supper but waited upon the negro, and the two walked out of the door. When Mr. Wright turned to lock the door, the negro struck him a heavy blow on the side of the head, felling his victim to the ground, insensible, and again striking him one or two blows. The negro then quickly took \$65 from Mr. Wright's pockets and made off for the woods. The affair was witnessed by a daughter of Mr. Wright, who was at his residence a short distance off, and she immediately gave the alarm. Pursuit was given to the negro as quickly as possible, with several dogs, but the scoundrel succeeded in reaching a dense swamp, and the dogs lost the trail and the negro effected his escape. Mr. Wright was very serious and painfully hurt—having one of his eyeballs turned in its socket.

A report was current in the city yesterday that two negroes implicated in this foul affair had been arrested, but we could get nothing reliable about the arrests, or the negroes. Mr. Wright said after he regained his consciousness from the blows, that he would know the negro who struck him if he could be arrested and brought before him, and if either of the negroes report under arrest is the guilty party there is some hope of identifying him that punishment he so richly deserves. It may be that he is the same villain who murdered Mr. Wilborn of this city some time ago, and more recently attempted to murder Mr. H. L. Jordan and Master Eddie Price.—*Judson News, Feb 13th.*

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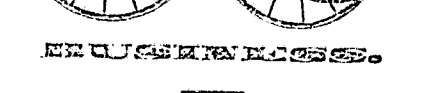
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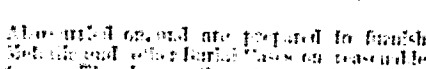
