Prattville, April 2, 1874.

Another new event is the appearance on the stage of a very wealthy Russian young lady; the daughter of one of the dignitaries of the empire. She has a most wonderful soprano voice, is a pupil of Lablache, and from an irresistible attraction towards artistic life, has chosen the career of a singer, under the name of Bellocca. We hope she will be more fortunate in her success than in the choice of her name, as it means in English, fine goods.

Among the notables present at Secretary Fish's last reception was Mrs. General Gaines, whose age is a matter of legal record, but who looks scarcely more than forty, where it seems as if she would have the rare fortune to remain. She usually wears a jaunty little hat, with a white or blue jessamine curling round its crown, at evening parties, and looks like a pretty picture just stepping from its frame in some choice gallery of portraits.

One of our friends in the country went coon hunting a few nights ago, and climbed a tree to shake down the coon; by accident he missed his hold and fell to the ground, and the canines supposing it was the coon that dropped, went for him. He told us sorrowfully that he had given up coon hunting.

Lancelotte is the name of the latest prodigy on the piano. He is a little Italian boy, who plays like a master, not only known compositions, but improvisations on any theme given him. He is only six years old, and has so revolutionized his own country that he has already been "démouillé" in Paris, where he arrived lately.

Thalberg has left a rich and varied collection of autograph musical scores and manuscripts of all sorts by Bach, Handel, Haydn, Mozart, Czerubini, Beethoven, Weber, Rossini, Bellini, Mendelssohn and other renowned composers. It is the intention of the widow to dispose of them by sale, and to devote the amount realized to some public charity.

An old citizen of Autauga county and one of the most practical and successful planters who called to see us yesterday, informed us that a much larger area of land is being planted in corn this year than any year previous since the war; and that the farmers are going to work with much more zeal and earnestness and energy, than they have ever heretofore manifested. Not only that, but in the future, they intended to raise their own meat and other necessities, and not any longer have their smoke houses and corn cribs up north. This is gratifying intelligence, and we may now indulge in many bright anticipations for a prosperous future.

The Savannah News thus illustrates a popular movement: Each ant in an ant hill knows his companions. Mr. Darwin several times carried ants from one hill to another, inhabited apparently by tens of thousands of ants, but the strangers were invariably detected and killed. Thinking there might be a family odor by which they were recognized; he put some ants from a very large nest into a bottle strongly perfumed with assafoetida, and restored them; after twenty-four hours, at first they were threatened by their companions, but soon recognized and allowed to pass.
