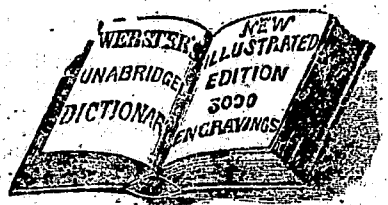

Prattville, March 5, 1874.

Marshal MacMahon is having the Column Vendome rebuilt. The eighth spiral has been finished, and the workmen declare their ability to complete the Column by the 1st of June.

Senator Schurz delivered a fine speech in the Senate not many days ago on the subject of Finance. He opposed inflation and depicted in glowing colors the evils to be apprehended from a "bloated currency."

A dentist in Georgia took a lien on a set of false teeth he put in a man's mouth. A judgment has been obtained on the lien, and the Sheriff is now in a quandary to know how he is going to enforce it.

Gen. Lewis Trezvant Wigfall died last week. He was born in South Carolina, was a member of the federal congress from Texas, and received a brigadier's commission during the late war.

The Ohio Legislature, being Democratic, was expected to repeal the Adair liquor law, but public opinion has been so excited by that women movement that it will hardly presume to do so.
