Supreme Court of Alabama, Order of Business for June Term, 1874.

It is ordered by the Court that the following shall be the order of business for the ensuing June Term of the Supreme Court of Alabama, commencing on the first Monday in June 1874:

The first division, composed of the counties of Baldwin, Clark, Mobile and Washington, shall commence on Monday, the first day of July, and continue one week.

The second division, composed of the counties of Bibb, Dallas, Monroe, Perry and Wilcox, shall commence on Monday the 8th day of June, 1874, and continue one week.

The third division, composed of the counties of Andalusia, Butler, Conecuh, Escambia, Lowndes and Montgomery, shall commence on Monday the 15th day of June, 1874, and continue one week.

The fourth division, composed of the counties of Bullock, Coffee, Conecuh, Henry and Pike, shall commence on Monday, the 22nd day of June, 1874, and continue one week.

The fifth division, composed of the counties of Baker, Chambers, Blount, Lee, Macon, Randolph, Russell and Tallapoosa, shall commence on Monday, the 29th day of June, 1874, and continue one week.

The sixth division, composed of the counties of Chilton, Greene, Hale, Marengo, Marion, Pickens, Sumter, Wilcox, and Walker, shall commence on Monday the 6th day of July, 1874, and continue one week.

The seventh division, composed of the counties of Calhoun, Chilton, Clay, Cleburne, Coosa, De Kalb, Etowah, Jefferson, Shelby and Talladega, shall commence on Monday, the 13th day of July, 1874, and continue one week.

The eighth division, composed of the counties of Blount, Colbert, Franklin, Jackson, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marshall, Morgan, St. Clair and

Laws Relating to Newspaper Subscriptions and Arrearages.

The following is the law as it stands relating to newspapers and subscribers:

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If the subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals, the publishers may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are sent they are held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered their discontinuance.
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
5. The Courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he orders it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
7. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice to the publisher, at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on, and the subscribers will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.

A Fifteen Hours' Walk for Life.

On Sunday afternoon, a young man named George Falk, swallowed, as he stated, three ounces of laudanum and five grains of morphia in order to end his life, as we reported yesterday. There was but one way of saving him, and that was to keep him in motion. After relieving him as far as possible, his physician, Dr. M. J. Gately, ordered that he be walked until he was out of danger.—At half past 2 o'clock, Sunday afternoon, he was put upon his tramp for life, and was forced to walk in the open air as rapidly as he could. His father kept by him for a long time, and a friend or a policeman assisted. After some hours, the father gave out, and finally, officers and friends grew tired. At last officers had to be taken from their beats and made to do duty in saving the life of the would-be suicide. When the walk commenced, it was with great difficulty that he could be kept going, and so great was his stupor that at times he would almost fall like a stick. Frequently it was necessary to catch him and move him on. He reeled at times like a drunken man, and then again he would revive considerably. The dreary, monotonous walk was kept up without intermission until half past 6 o'clock, yesterday morning, when the physician consented that he should be allowed to take rest. The life of the young man was saved, but the struggle for freedom from the effects of the drugs, was a severe one. To have stopped three minutes would have been fatal. *Baltimore Gazette.*

Weeping Over the Grave.

On the 2d of May a delegation composed of Representatives Senor of Virginia, Maynard of Tennessee, Ward of Illinois, Storm of Pennsylvania, Captain Marshall of the Engineer Corps, and others, visited Fredericksburg, Va., mainly for the purpose of examining the monument erected to the memory of the mother of Washington. The House of Representatives some time ago passed a resolution directing this examination, with a view possibly of completing it. Among the names of the carpet-baggers and sealawags who met the delegation at Fredericksburg we see the John G. Stokes, late of Montgomery, and once the editor of the Radical journal of that city. We would like to know what business Stokes has weeping over the grave of Washington's mother. It is worse than Mark Twain weeping over the tomb of Adam. As a business enterprise we would suggest a chromo, to be sold among the negroes, representing John Stokes at the grave of Mary Washington.—*Mobile Register.*

TELEGRAMS.

Little Rock, May 14.—Both Houses met this morning and adopted the following joint resolution: "Whereas, the Legislature of the State of Arkansas has convened a quorum in each House present; whereas, the Capital of our State is occupied by armed and contending forces; and whereas, the State House is now in possession of armed troops; therefore, be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that the President of the United States be, and is hereby requested to put this Legislature in possession of the Legislative Halls and that the public property in the State House Square be placed under the supervision and control of this body, the legal custodian thereof, whilst in session, and that he make such order for the disposition of said armed contending forces as will more perfectly protect the State against domestic violence and insure this body protection, and that a duly certified copy of this resolution be at once transmitted to the President of the United States. In the House a large number of notices of the introduction of bills were given, among others, for calling a Constitution. The situation as to the two armed forces remaining unchanged.—The Senate appointed a Committee to act in conjunction with the House Committee, appointed yesterday, to notify Governor Baxter that the General Assembly was ready to receive any message he might desire to deliver. The Governor's message, it is thought, will be read to both Houses this evening.

Little Rock, May 14.—The General Assembly met in joint convention today and received a message from Baxter. It simply repeated the story of recent events, and informs the Legislature that to them is submitted the question "who is Governor of Arkansas?" He suggests the propriety of calling a Constitutional Convention, owing to the great want of harmony in laws, both statutory and constitutional. Twenty seven ex-Union soldiers and Northern men have united in a dispatch to Senator Morten and General John Coburn contradicting the telegram sent those gentlemen to the effect that by Baxter succeeds, Northern men will be driven out of the State.

The New Christian Advocate says: "A friend, who has carefully counted up the results of the woman's temperance movement thus far, gives us the following figures: Thirty-seven cities and towns con-

tirely freed from the liquor traffic; one thousand seven hundred and sixty-one liquor saloons in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois closed; and eight hundred liquor sellers not only reformed, but hopefully converted to Christ."
