OUR CEMETERY.

We believe that it is generally admitted by all our citizens who have any occasion to visit our cemetery, that it is in a most dilapidated condition and greatly needs fixing up. It is true that we cannot do the dead any good by adorning and beautifying the quiet grounds where their dust is mingling with its mother earth, yet, we feel that, as a mark of respect for their memory, we should protect their remains and make their last resting place as

beautiful as possible. The cemetery of Tusculum, in its present condition, would certainly not attract the eye of a stranger, except on account of its woe-begone and forlorn appearance. The importance of improving and taking better care of the cemetery has impressed itself on the minds of many of our citizens, and at last a step has been taken, as we trust, in the right direction, which will insure its better protection and give it some more attractive features.

Last week, when many of the ladies and gentlemen of our city assembled at the cemetery for the purpose of decorating the soldiers' graves, it was there and then proposed to form an association, whose business and duty it would be to take charge of the cemetery and have it kept in good order. Temporary officers were elected and a committee was appointed to draw up a constitution and by-laws for the government of the association. We gave notice of this first last week but did not have time to call the attention of our readers to another feature in the matter, which is by far the most important. We allude to the money feature. To accomplish the objects that this association has in view, money is needed; without money the whole enterprise must fail. By a small annual contribution upon the part of every citizen in our place who has any interest whatever in this cemetery, a sufficient amount of money can be raised to accomplish the purposes of the association. We therefore appeal to every one of our citizens to become members of this association and contribute to its treasury. By the plan which this association proposes to adopt, if the citizens will assist, enough money can be raised to employ a sexton, in whose charge the cemetery will be placed, and who will be expected to keep it in good order. We trust that our citizens will all respond liberally when they are called upon to subscribe.

Spain.

Bayonne, April 29, 1874.—The latest dispatches from the seat of war to hand this morning state that General Manuel de la Concha, with a body of republicans, numbering 20,000 men has moved from the southeast, twenty-two miles south west of Bilbao, for the purpose of striking the Carlists in the rear.

Marshal Serrano, with a force, equally as strong, is to make a simultaneous attack on the insurgents from the front. The Carlists are reported to be strongly entrenched. London, April 29, 1874.—A special dispatch to the Daily Standard from Bayonne denies that Portuguese and San Quero have been evacuated by the Carlists.

Louisville, May 1.—General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the South, assembled at Public Library Hall, this morning. About two thousand delegates representing every Southern State except Virginia, are in attendance, including all of the six Bishops. Rev. Dr. Paine, as Senior Bishop presides. Dr. T. O. Summers, of Nashville, was re-elected Secretary and standing Committee were appointed. In the afternoon resolutions were offered providing for the appointment of a committee of seven to ascertain how far parsonages and school buildings are held, kept and claimed by the Methodist Episcopal Church in violation of the rights of the Methodist Episcopal Church obtained possession of such property. The point being made that the resolution is very important that its discussion be postponed until to-morrow. A number more delegates are expected to-night.

A Correspondent of the Petersburg (Va.) News met Hon. A. H. Stephens on the cars, en route for his home in Georgia, when Mr. S. said: "I am going home to die. 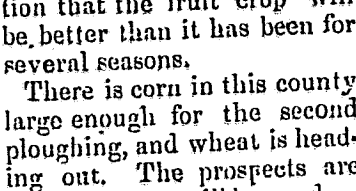
