THE Vindicator says the negroes are behaving better in Wilcox than they ever have since the war. There is less crime of all kinds, and our jail that had over fifty inmates a few months ago, has now only nine. They are working well and seem to be animated with a proper spirit. If they would only let politics alone, and apply their energies to something useful, they would find their condition greatly benefited, and would soon win the confidence of white men. Any how a good change seems to have taken place and we congratulate them on good prospects ahead.

Wade Hampton has issued a circular in behalf of the Southern Historical Society, in which he says: "I appeal to every man and to every woman of the South who has a pride in our past glory or our future honor; who wishes to place upon the record for all time to come the vindication of our people; who desires to see the whole truth laid before the august tribunal of history; who cherish amid all these evil times love and reverence for our heroic dead, or who hopes that our children shall not denounce their fathers as rebels and traitors, to aid this sacred work. To insure the success of the society it will be necessary to obtain a large membership, so that the unavoidable expenses incident to its work may be met."

Resolutions of Choctaw Corner Grange.

At a meeting of Choctaw Corner Grange, No. 197, on the 28th ult., the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, we view with deep regret the depressed condition of our country, and whereas we believe that much of it has been caused by our own mismanagement, therefore—

Resolved 1st, That we recommend to every member of our Grange to use every laudable effort to free themselves from debt at the earliest possible moment.

2d. That we earnestly recommend our members to at once see the parties whom they owe and make a true and just statement of their means of paying.

3. That we recommend the most rigid economy in our apparel and living, and although we should not appear as comely as we would wish, yet we earnestly recommend a strict adherence to this rule.

4th. That we earnestly recommend the education of our children, and that each family provide themselves (as far as their means will permit) with good religious, agricultural, horticultural and miscellaneous reading matter, and that each member encourage habits of reading and study among their children.

5th. That we will not employ any laborer who has left a member of our order unless by written discharge or personal agreement.

6th. That we will plant enough land in corn, oats, peas, &c., to support the labor necessary to cultivate our farms, and that the cotton crop shall as far as possible be an extra crop.

7th. That we will (as far as it is in our power) patronize, aid and assist members of our order in all laudable undertakings, and that we will do all we can to support and encourage the agents employed by the Executive Committee of our State Grange.

8th. That we earnestly recommend the formation of a Council of Granges in Clarke county at as early a day as possible.

9th. That the Secretary forward a copy of these resolutions to Isaac Grant, Esq. for publication.

Crockett on the Farmers.

In an address lately delivered before a gathering of farmers, Mr. John M. Crockett, of Texas, said:

You are the only class of people that produce anything, unless I except a few miners. You are the only people that add one cent of value to the commonwealth. By your toil alone, and by the sweat of your face, the government is supported. All the mercantile world and all the professional men, all the mechanics, the railroads, the shipping, the army and the navy are upheld and supported by your labor. Not one cent of value, do any, either or all of them produce, create, or bring into existence for their individual sustenance, or the support of their various trades. Nay, let the farmers of the country suspend their operations for one year; and the whole machinery of trade, from the princely merchant and banker to the vender of ginger-bread on the streets, must fail. Railroads must cease to bear the ponderous trains, and the fires of the locomotives must go out; manufacturers must turn off their laboring millions and stop the wheels of machinery, and millions and millions of those who live by their wits, must perish in the streets. Every civilized being on the face of the earth is dependent upon the farmer for what he or she eats or possesses. The farmers are the great power in the land—could command the trade and the greatest enterprises of the world, and yet they are truly the menials, the slaves. They toil and struggle to bring forth the fruits of the earth, the only constituents of wealth, and others live upon and enjoy them.

The Granges of Jefferson county will meet in Birmingham on the first Monday in April to organize a County Council.

A call has been made in this county for a meeting on the fourth Wednesday in March for the same object.

Supreme Court Decisions.

[Montgomery Advertiser.]

The Supreme Court, on yesterday, affirmed the judgment of the court below in the matter of the application of Sheriff Strobach, for mandamus requiring Auditor Smith to issue his warrant to said sheriff for fees claimed by him, for feeding misdemeanor prisoners, held in confinement on mittimus. The court below granted the mandamus. The Auditor appealed, and the Supreme Court affirms the judgment of the court below. This settles the responsibility of sheriffs in such cases. They cannot release prisoners thus held on their own recognizance; it is the duty of the officer making the arrest, or the committing magistrate to do that. But if the magistrate neglects his duty and sends them on, the sheriff is compelled to receive and hold them until they are released by due course of law.

In the matter of the application of Superintendent Speed for mandamus, the Court decided (1) That the act of April 19th, 1873, entitled "an act to keep in the several counties of the State a proportionate share of the public money," was constitutional; and (2) That the Funding Act of December, 1873, was not in conflict with any of the provisions of said act. The mandamus was therefore awarded. The constitutionality of the funding act was not passed upon—such action not being material to the relief sought. The decision of the court gives Superintendent Speed the mastery of the situation as some \$400,000 of taxes will now be absorbed by his department without ever reaching the State Treasury.

Justice Brickell read the opinion in this case, which was quite lengthy. Justice Saffold filed the following opinion, by which it will be seen he agreed with the court on the main point at issue, but would have preferred to pass upon the constitutional objections to the funding act.—[We omit his opinion.—Ed DEMOCRAT.]

An Error.—We notice in most of our exchanges which give the officers of our State Grange, that the Lady Assistant Steward is published as living in Greene county. Mrs. D. H. Odom is the lady and she resides in Clarke, the banner county of the Order.

Corn is now being planted very generally. We trust that enough may be planted to insure an abundance for the next year, even with an average season for its production. Keep planting it until you occupy about two-thirds or three-fourths of the land you intend to cultivate. You were advised to this course a year ago, but wanted to plant too much cotton, and the worms ate it up. Be wiser this year.

TRAPPERS.—A small company of trappers—three men—arrived at Jacksonville the first of last week from the upper river with over three hundred beaver skins and a number of other skins. They had the skins packed in a cotton press and expressed them to New York. These men were engaged in the same business the winter before last, and we learn that they realized \$2 25 for their beaver skins and a considerably larger sum for their other skins. We are informed that they sent their traps to some point in Arkansas where they propose to operate next winter.

This is a good business, and aside from its profitability, a good service is rendered the country in the destruction of the beavers which are accumulating very rapidly and causing much trouble in many places.
