**A Model Anti-Reputationist.**

Mr. Joseph H. Sloss feels that the good name and fair fame of Alabama is imperiled. The apprehension that her people will refuse to pay debts the never authorized or created, fills his soul with horrid fears. Playing his last engagement on the public stage, he withdraws his mind from thoughts of his personal future, and with patriotic zeal interposes his advice and counsel between the people and their interests. The course of Mr. Sloss does not surprise us. He believes in making the people pay. He agreed to serve them two years for \$10,000, and on the last day of his service required them to "shell out" \$5,000 more. He had the power to plunder them of so much, and the thought of submitting the equity of his claim to the courts never entered his head. He voted the money—\$5,000 extra for services already performed under an express agreement—from the people's pockets into his own. From one end of the country to the other, the people, Democrats and Republicans alike, denounced the dishonesty and indecency of this act to which Mr. Sloss was an active party, and denounced those who consented to it or participated in it. So strong was his popular feeling, that many Democratic and Republican Representatives and Senators from the North and the South, refused, out of respect to it, to receive the back pay. Mr. Sloss was not one of these. He received the money and kept it. So universal was the popular condemnation of this back pay and increased pay inquiry, that on re-assembling Congress made haste to repeal it so far as it relates to the present and future. Mr. Sloss was one of the little handful of shameless representatives who voted against the repeal. It is meet and proper that he should come to the front and condemn the people for a disposition to refuse to pay debts they don't owe.

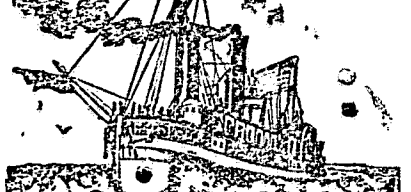
