NEWS OF THE WEEK.

EAST.

A joint resolution has passed both branches of the Pennsylvania legislature, by a unanimous vote, asking the president of the United States to appoint a board to investigate the proceedings in the case of Gen. Fitz-John Porter.

WEST.

Woods fires are raging in Michigan. Much lumber, timber, etc., has been destroyed, and it is feared that great loss will ensue.

The conductor of the National House near Milwaukee, excludes the sheriff from attending to the ground that the state has no jurisdiction of the institution and it is under the articles of war.

A passenger train on the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago railroad, bound east, was thrown from the track at Summit station, on the 4th, by a mischievous child, and all the cars, except the refrigerator, and all the passengers, were totally consumed. A large mass of mail and express matter, including the California mail, was burned.

SOUTH.

The oat crop in southern Georgia has been cut short half by bad weather, rust and insects.

Dr. J. Stevenson, nephew of Gov. Brown, was shot and killed by a man named John W. Carter, about eleven miles east of Athens, Ala., on the 6th inst.

Dr. Jesse Boring, of Troup county, Georgia, has been awarded \$10,000 as damages resulting from an accident on the Western railroad, whereby his leg was broken.

The part of the Solms, Roma and Dalton railroad which lies in Georgia, will be sold before the court-house door in Rome, on the second Tuesday in July, to the highest bidder.

Peter C. Cox has recovered a verdict for \$35,000 damages before a Louisville jury for loss of a leg, on the Louisville and Nashville railroad. The road will apply for a new trial.

There is to be a convention of cotton economists at Augusta, Ga., on the 30th of June, to consider the feasibility of improving the facilities for obtaining information about the cotton market and the crop.

Reports from New Orleans say that all the crocodiles on the levee are dead. The work of repair and replanting has commenced. The sugar cane on the inundated places has not been entirely destroyed.

C. A. Haynes, negro mail agent at Wilmington, Delaware, and brother of the negro secretary of state for South Carolina, has been sentenced by the United States district court to four years in the penitentiary for robbing the mails.

An appeal is published for the urgent relief of sufferers by floods in the south. It states that over 140,000 people have been driven from their homes and are now without food or shelter, and that to furnish these provisions alone will cost \$25,000 a day.

The southern Baptist convention is in session at Jefferson, Texas. About 3,000 delegates are present. James D. Boyce, D. D., of Louisville, president. Dr. Burrows, of Richmond, James, of Nashville, president, and Devoto, of Georgia, are vice presidents.

The police of Atlanta have had trouble with the Federal troops stationed there. In the melee that occurred last week one soldier was killed, and it was feared that a regular pitched battle would ensue. It is thought, however, that the difficulty is ended.

The legislature of North Carolina has passed an act which provides that any person who manufactures, sells or deals in spurious liquors as a drink, or any name or kind containing foreign properties or ingredients poisonous to the system, shall be punished with five years imprisonment in the penitentiary.

Thomas Barlow was arrested four days ago, at Dekalb, Mississippi, by John P. Gilman, on the charge of having murdered Daniel Thomas, in Cannon county, Tennessee, in 1872. He has been turned over to the military authorities, and a reward of \$300, offered by the governor, for Barlow's arrest, has been paid to Gilman.

FOREIGN.

Capt. Gen. Concha has issued a decree ordering the formation of eight battalions of colored militia.

Notwithstanding recent successes, Madrid is threatened with another ministerial crisis and Serrano heads a few weeks for deliberation.

After the capture of Bilbao, the Spanish government again applied to Germany for the recognition of the republic. Detached bands of Carlists continue to harass the neighborhood of Bilbao.

Much joy was manifested by the citizens of Lisbon over the entry into Bilbao of the Spanish republican troops. Crowds of people headed by bands of music, paraded the streets shouting "Bilbao and liberty."

Don Manuel Concha, who is said to be the real commander of the Spanish republican troops, is a thirty-eight year old man. His brother, Don Jose, who has been lately named Governor of Cuba, is over seventy-four.

Gen. Ocho is said to have arrested four brigadier generals in the Carlist army on charges of treason. Ocho will shortly issue a new proclamation to his troops. Gen. Ocho has been appointed general-in-chief of the army. During the bombardment of Bilbao, 150 citizens were killed and wounded.

The American oriental topographical corps have reached Jerusalem after making a very successful exploration in the vicinity of Mount Sinai. They report as a very remarkable fact that they were detained two days by a heavy storm about Mount Sinai. The expedition will soon leave for Bashan and Moab.

Additional dispatches from Bilbao state that parties of Carlists are surrounding in hope of amnesty. The main body, however, is retreating in disorder in the direction of the province of Guipuzcoa. Bilbao is still assuming the wonted appearance and trade is reviving. The obstructions placed in the river Nervion to prevent the arrival of government war vessels have been removed.

Detachment of the fire in the town of San Francisco, California, on the 28th of January, have been recovered. Two children, left to themselves, had the house on fire. The conflagration extended so rapidly that in the course of four hours half of the houses in the town—nearly 2,000—were destroyed. Not a fruit tree remained. Thousands of wheat, fruit and other crops, and multitudes of cattle perished. Fifteen persons, including six children, were burned to death.

CONGRESSIONAL.

In the senate, on the 4th, Mr. Pease submitted a resolution requesting the house to return to the senate the bill of last week appropriating \$200,000 for the relief of persons suffering from the overflow of the Mississippi river. He said his object in submitting the resolution was to have the bill again before the senate that he might move to increase the appropriation. The resolution was agreed to.

The committee on pensions reported a bill to amend and consolidate the laws relating to pensions. It provides for the payment of pensions to persons who have lost an arm or a leg, or who have been disabled by disease or accident. The bill was passed by a vote of 75 yeas and 15 nays.
