Coal is selling at Birmingham, Ala., at \$1.50 per ton and in Tuscaloosa, at \$2.50. It retails here at \$1.00. Yet the Warrior river is navigable to Tuscaloosa during the winter months and coal could be delivered here in barges at \$8.00 per ton with a large margin of profit. About one week's time would be required to make the trip. Any one having five hundred dollars and engaging in the business of bringing coal in barges from Tuscaloosa to this place, might clear one hundred and fifty to two hundred dollars per month. Let some active man go into the business.

Hull and cabin.....\$2,600  
Machinery.....1,500  
Total.....\$4,100

The capacity of such a steamer would be about 100 tons and the draught of water according to the weight and power of machinery.

The grade is already level except at the slough across which a short bridge would be required. This road equipped with freight cars drawn by horses, would greatly facilitate the transfer of the staple from the river to the Ala. Cent. railroad. It would pay the railroad to lay down this track if there is much cotton to be expected here for re-shipment.
