GRANGERS' COLUMN.

Too Many at the Same Trick

An intelligent gentleman from the lower part of Russell county, Ala., warns us not to be deceived by the many reports of newspapers and correspondents, to the effect that the farmers are this year going to plant much corn and little cotton. He says that while all of them approve that policy, so many of them are really putting for all the cotton they can cultivate, as to remind him of the preacher's barrel of wine. The story is, that the friends of a popular minister, in some region of the country where native wine is more abundant than here, determined to present him with a barrel of the home-made article on some anniversary of his life. The plan was for the barrel to be placed in the vestibule of the church, with the bung out, and for each man to bring a bottle of wine and empty it in the barrel. It occurred to some that if they should bring water instead of wine and empty it in the barrel, the little trick would never be found out, because no one could detect a single bottle of water in a barrel of wine. But it turned out that the same idea had occurred to all of them, and when the barrel was sampled there was nothing but water in it.

So, our friend says, it is going to be with the cotton planters this year. They will talk corn until you may think they are going to convert the South into Egypt like that of the time of Joseph; but when planting time comes they are going to slip in the cotton seed on the sly, each one believing that his neighbors have planted mostly corn, and that his big cotton crop will never affect the market.

We hope that our friend is mistaken as to the extent to which this game is about to be played; but we have no doubt whatever that some planters are contemplating the repetition of the water trick. It won't do. When a man feels the prompting of a sneaking selfishness in himself, he may bet his bottom dollar that there are many others experiencing the same qualms. The only reliable way to increase the corn and diminish the cotton crop is for each planter to do his own part towards it; then, and not otherwise, will he have a right to expect that others will pursue the same course. Use that cotton seed as a fertilizer, and substitute corn for planting.—Columbus Enquirer.
