### The Cotton Crop and Future.

Smith & Edwards' cotton circular, dated London, February 23, contains for a crop of 4,250,000 bales, in which the indications are now that they will be disappointed. Speaking of the cotton future, they allude to the heavy increase of production in

the northern cotton belt, to which they attribute the unexpected magnitude of the incoming crop, and they say:

"We have had the pleasure of reading some interesting and reliable correspondence from one who traveled through the belt of cotton lands stretching from North Carolina to Arkansas, and the reports he gives of increased cultivation and extraordinary growth from the use of the fertilizers are most striking. We are led to believe that in this section the growth of cotton must have doubled within the last few years, and is now far greater than it was before the American war, and what is more important still, it is chiefly the result of white labor. The thrifty Western farmers are taking to cotton culture, and apply an energy and skill which enable them to produce much more cheaply than the Southern planters. There seems to be every reason to expect a steady increase of cotton cultivation in this northern zone, and we do not hear that the results of the crop have at all discouraged the growers; but it is somewhat different with the old cotton lands worked entirely by negroes. The planters there still rely a good deal upon credit, and owing to the late crisis in America they find much greater difficulty than heretofore in getting advances. Already we hear it stated that a serious reduction in the area planted will take place this year, and we think it not unlikely that, if prices drop during the next two months, some

diminution of planting will take place in the southern portion of the cotton region. How far that will be counterbalanced by an increase in the Northern section we are not prepared to say. We should hesitate to believe in any great diminution with the light before us at present, but the next two months will decide the course of our market during the latter part of the year. With the present prospect of supply it will be difficult to stir up much speculation, and if receipts hold on well

A FURTHER TEMPORARY DECLINE is quite possible. One point has been discussed a good deal in America of late—that is, the great superiority of the crop to the last one. It is alleged by some who have carefully inquired into the matter, that its spinning value is 10 per cent. greater. We think this estimate is excessive, at the same time we should say that, considering the far better staple, and the smaller amount of sand and dust in the bales, its yarn producing power is at least 5 per cent. greater. It is a material item, for in one respect it adds 200,000 or 300,000 bales to the supply compared with last year; it would be a mistake, however, to suppose that so much less will be needed for consumption. The clean good staple cotton goes more quickly through the machinery, and perhaps as many bales will be consumed by the spindles as last year, but the out-turn of yarn will be much greater. It should be remembered, however, that there is abundant room to substitute yarn size in the composition of Lancashire goods such as have been manufactured the last few years, and we may hope that the increased spinning power of the crop will disappear in this innocent way, without unduly glutting the yarn market or depressing the raw material.
