### A Sensible Letter.

We commend to the weak headed the following letter written by a prominent Columbus merchant to a friend in this city.

My Dear Sir:—We must not succumb to the difficulties environing us. Greatness and glory are ever in proportion to triumph, victory over dangers and impediments. We must not abandon our good homes, our good country, but fight with all our might the civilization surrounding us. This belt of country, our home is not surpassed, nor equaled by any in the United States in its natural resources and advantages, and under the management of capacity and energy will lead rapidly to fortune and a high order of civilization.

Much of the misfortunes and troubles now upon our section have been caused by a mania which has seized upon our agricultural class since the war—haste to fortune, led by the ignis fatuus—making haste to get rich—that they might change home, place, business—they have stumbled on in their speculative ideas, ignoring all the great fundamental truths which pave the road to success, fortune, happiness, and now we cry for wings to bear us to a new "Alabama"—giving rest with easy roads to fortune, where no thieving odorous "nigger" dare approach.

No land—no home on earth bears or brings fortune or rest within itself. Action, energy, warmed and burning with love to God, man and country, make vigorous souls, strong arms and wings that alone bear us to real "Alabama."

Suppose at the end of the war you had settled on your farm—section—with zeal and all determination to master circumstances? Had picked your labor, and planted 100 acres in oats, peas and potatoes, and (50) acres in cotton, and planned and studied and worked for the moral improvement as well as pecuniary of self and laborers, and suppose this had been your program each year up to the present? What do you think would be your condition? Suppose each farmer, planter—in Montgomery county had remained upon his farm, and managed in the same way, what would lands be worth in your county, and what would be the condition of your people to-day?

Many of the planters of the country have yearly been crowding into the mercantile, trading interest, until this interest has languished almost to ruin, from excessive inexperienced competition, and the weight of a decaying agricultural interest.

The planting interest has been pursued upon a speculative basis in speculative channels and these combined facts are leading the legitimate mercantile business into the same vortex. The mercantile interests of our section are dependent upon the agricultural—then you must not neglect the latter in the former when the latter is waning.

### Pike County Council.

In response to a call, issued by circular letters, from Pike County Grange, a convention of the Patrons of Husbandry was held in this city on Saturday last, at the City Academy. The temporary organization consisted of a President, Hon. W. J. McBryde; Secretary, Maj. J. P. Wood; Gate Keeper, R. J. Carlisle. The following Granges were represented by delegates: Troy, Pike River, Orion, Spring Hill, Pea River No. 2, Brundage, Tan Yard, Hilliard's X Roads and Richmond.

After completing all preliminary arrangements, the Convention proceeded to organize a Council, with the following result: President, Hon. Wm. J. McBryde; Vice-Presidents, W. L. Hendrick, T. K. Mullins and John A. Law; Treasurer, James Addicks; Secretary, J. M. Sanders; Corresponding Secretary, John D. Gardner; Overseer, J. T. McCreary; Steward, C. C. Reeves; Gate Keeper, E. H. Hobdy; Executive Committee, S. J. Townsend, W. J. Owens, C. Carlisle, J. Y. Wood, J. N. King, Dr. F. Hendrick, Q. P. Siler and F. A. Jackson.

As several Granges in the county were not represented in the Convention, it was voted that each Grange not duly represented be requested to select one Patron to complete the Executive Committee, which is to be composed of one member from each Grange in Pike County. The President, on motion, appointed Messrs. W. J. Owens, W. L. Hendrick and J. P. Wood, a committee to draw up resolutions to be submitted at the next meeting of the Council, which is to be held on the first Saturday in April. Messrs. J. T. Jackson, James Thaddeus and J. D. Gardner were also appointed a committee to prepare a Constitution and By-Laws for the future government of the Council, which will be presented for adoption at the next meeting of the body. It is hoped there will be a full attendance upon that occasion, and that a full list will be reported for the Executive Committee, as no time should be lost in perfecting the organization and commencing active operations.—Troy Messenger.
