The decision of Judge Cunnin-

gham in granting a new trial to Pat

Robinson was the universal theme of

conversation yesterday afternoon.

The Judge granted the new trial as

he stated in his opinion, upon error,

which he alleges was committed by

certain in allowing the whole of a

brief book to be submitted to the

Jury when only a part of it should

have gone before them legally. All

objections were overruled, but the main

object of the counsel for the defense,

### GRANGERS' COLUMN.

#### Crops in West Alabama—Effects of the Flood.

Editors Advertiser:—The rains and the flood being over, I have concluded to drop you a line from this section of the country. Marengo county has suffered perhaps as much as any county in Alabama, from the short crop last year, and from the floods of rain and the cold snaps recently.

The uplands have been washed and gullied, and much of the rich soil carried completely away. The stands of corn and cotton very much injured. In fact the cotton is the poorest ever known at this season of the year. From a deficient germ these have not come up well, and in many instances of the coming up have failed.

The bottom lands on the Bigbee are yet entirely submerged, and there is no telling when the waters will recede and allow the crops planted. But this oft-told tale comes from all quarters of the cotton region at present.

We are thankful in the blessing of a plenty to eat, such as it is. The freedmen seem at last to have realized the necessity of going to work.

At the present writing they are more in earnest, than I have ever seen them since the close of the war.

As a general thing the planters are doing their utmost, to avert ruin, by planting very full crops of corn and cotton, although the price of cotton begins to be stimulating.

Short crops of corn and cotton seem inevitable at present. Though it is to be hoped that the country will possess the sense and foresight to plant very largely in all provisions and not take the chances of growing rich in one year by cotton. Remember the disastrous past and be warned of the future.

For this long wet spell will, almost certainly, be followed by an equally long dry spell, which will materially injure the crop.

Well, leaving crops, to take care of themselves, let us look at the political attitude of affairs in this country. In this we have reason to be truly thankful, for beyond all doubt Marengo will take her place among the Democratic and Conservative counties of Alabama.

The exodus of negroes to the West will not have as much to do with the accomplishment of this result as the apathy and disgust of the darker with politics. I mean the regular corn-field negro. He is so constituted that he cannot work in any cause, or adhere to it, without a certain amount of reward.

He has been promised so much by the Radicals, and has seen the "forty acres and mule" fade into the air so often that even his dull comprehension and obtuse intellect begins to understand slowly the value of such promises.

In my humble opinion the race issue is our salvation. We do not want the negro vote if we have to use fraud and duplicity in obtaining it. He is not the equal of the white man, and it is no harm to let him know it, but on the contrary it is hurtful to place him in a false position.

Let us whip out these vandals in an open field and a fair fight. No more at present from your friend,
