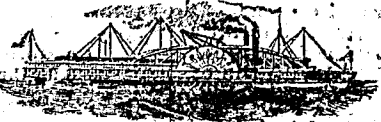

**Meeting of Young Men's Christian Association.**

A meeting will be held in the basement of the Court Street M. E. Church, at 8 o'clock to-night, and all interested in the cause are invited to attend.

**BY TELEGRAPH.**

Reported by the Associated Press for the Montgomery Daily Advertiser.

**WASHINGTON, May 10.**

At a very late hour last night a plan of adjustment for the serious troubles in Arkansas, was telegraphed from this city to both of the disputants for the office of Governor of that State. Their representatives and attorneys had been in session all day yesterday, and were now with the Attorney General, at his private residence up to midnight last night, discussing some method which would receive the approval of the general Government. It has now been agreed that both parties call a session of the legislature to meet at Little Rock on the 4th Monday in May. Each to make a special call. No opposition to Baxter. Both parties to have a full hearing, and the legislature to determine who received a majority in 1872. Both Governors are to disarm, with the exception of a body guard, and to abstain from all violent movements, and from all interference with each other or their adherents.

The Attorney General dispatches to both parties the telegram of which the above is the substance, saying it was submitted for the approval of the President, and the expressions of the hope that it would settle the questions at issue.

**PARIS, May 10.**  
The late severe frosts have done considerable damage to the vines throughout the country. It is estimated that the grape crop for the present year, will not be above half an average one.

**LITTLE ROCK, May 10.**  
Baxter refused to accede to the proposition submitted by the Attorney General of the United States, for the settlement of pending difficulties, giving the following reasons for such refusal: "That he submitted substantially to the same propositions to Brooks sometime ago, and they were rejected, Brooks announcing that he would have nothing to do with the legislature; that it had no jurisdiction, and he would not recognize it, or anything it might do." Baxter alleges there is a quorum of the legislature now here, assembled under his call, with the President's assurance of protection, and that they will meet to-morrow and determine the question. He will recommend a call of a Constitutional Convention, with a view of submitting the whole question to a vote of the people. Brooks has not signified what he will do, but from the position, heretofore taken by him, it is believed that he too will refuse to accede to the Attorney General's proposed settlement.

Forty shots were fired and one negro killed. Federal troops again brought Hook and Ladd's Company against us to the front, when hostilities ceased. The Federals are entrenching. All the stores are moved. Women and children have been moved from the vicinity of the Statehouse.

**CINCINNATI, May 10.**

A riot between the striking union miners, and those who are willing to work, resulted in the death of three men, at Nelsonville, Athens county. A train has been sent to quell the riot, and the ringleaders are arrested.

**LOUISVILLE, May 10.**

Proceedings of General Conference of Methodist Episcopal Church Saturday were mainly in relation to reports from the Executive Committee of the Alabama State Conference. Among them was a report from Committee on Itinerancy, upon memorial from Louisiana Conference, praying for creation of a German Conference in the South, also recommendation that preachers stay in one place be limited to four years. A law was also recommended that un-

perannated preachers be included in district Conferences in which they reside.

Committee on Sunday school recommended continuation of Sunday school Secretaryship. Committee to reply to proposition of Methodist Episcopal Church made yesterday was appointed.

**SAVANNAH, May 10.**

Governor Caldwell of North Carolina, publishes a notice in the *Morning News*, that the reward of \$5000 offered for General M. S. Littlefield, some years since, will be paid to any one delivering him to the Sheriff of Buncombe county. Littlefield is implicated in syndicates in North Carolina in 1868 and ran away to Florida, where he has been engaged in doubtful railroad transactions. The several Governors of Florida, have refused to recognize the requisitions for him.

**LONDON, May 10.**

Wm. Patrick Adam will succeed Sir Robert Peel as Liberal Whip.

**MADRID, May 10.**

The question of re-organization of the Government is the absorbing topic at Madrid at present. Masia Serrano says he will form a better Cabinet than the existing one, but has deferred consideration of the subject until his health which is improving is completely restored.

**BALTIMORE, May 11.**

The Fifth Quinquennial Convocation of the Sisters of Charity of North America was inaugurated yesterday, at St. Joseph's Convent, near Emmetsburg, in Frederick county, Maryland. About three hundred and fifty Sisters, comprising Superiors of many monasteries, hospitals, and other institutions, at San Francisco, Boston, Buffalo, New Orleans and other cities, and representing, with but few exceptions, every American diocese, were present. Mass was celebrated by Very Rev. Father Guedry, Superior of the Community in the United States. The Convocation will continue until Tuesday, the 17th of May.

**LONDON, May 11.**

A dispatch from Bayonne says that Don Carlos has issued a proclamation announcing that he will offer strenuous resistance to the Republican army in the Biscay provinces.

Lieutenant-General Sir Archibald Wilson, knighted for services at the capture of Delhi, in 1857, is dead.

It is feared that the Siberia from Liverpool for Madeira with all on board is lost.

**NEW YORK, May 11.**

Arrived--Steinman; and out Lake St. Clair, Anna Maria, Harriet C. Carter, Ocean Pearl, Willie S. Thompson, Proteus, Kurland, Kate Conn, Chas. F. Elwell.

Gold opened at 129.8.

A Little Rock Special dated last eve contains the following: Two negroes were killed by Baxter's pickets near the Fair Grounds yesterday morning. In the evening several skirmishes advanced up the street and joined Baxter's pickets when the officer in command ordered all citizens to their houses and soldiers to their quarters, the regulars kept close at their barracks. A fight was expected at any time during the evening.

There are two companies of regulars at the City Hall, one at U. S. Court building, and artillery with horses and were taken to a side street. The regulars have four barricades in the city and one on the opposite side of the river. Orders were issued by all parties yesterday evening for soldiers to go to quarters, and the citizens to keep in their homes in the evening.

Col. White, of the Baxter force, rode to outskirts of the city, and the regulars followed shortly after.

**WASHINGTON, May 11.**

The House passed the bill appropriating \$10,000 for the improvement of the Oostenaula River in Georgia.

The Senate bill for the better organization of the U. S. District Courts in Louisiana was recommitted to the Judiciary.

**LITTLE ROCK, May 11.**

Federal Colonel Rose, has ordered the restoration of the Steamer Hattie, to the owners, whereupon the Brooksites scuttled her and sank her to the hurricane deck. Both parties are reinforced. Lines are closely drawn.

More cannon are planted. A number of Senators and Representatives have appealed to Grant for protection on their assembly.

**MEMPHIS, May 10.**

The steamer Cheek from below, brings important news regarding the overflow of the Mississippi. At 6 o'clock yesterday a. m. the levees in front of Frias Point on the Mississippi broke, and also that at Maynards and Millers. The former crevasse is one hundred yards wide, and the latter fifty, and the outside water level was fully five feet above the level inside, water poured through in an immense volume defying all attempts to check it and soon inundated the towns and surrounding country. Crevasse will inundate very large and rich sections of the cotton lands. St. Francis was stationary yesterday, and the levee on the Arkansas side still holds good.

About two thousand hands are engaged in strengthening it, but the river had made a cut off yesterday at Council Bend, cutting off some fourteen miles and in consequence the river is rising below the cut off at the rate of one inch per hour.

Further news from Helena is anxiously looked for.

The wind has lulled and Muskegon is considered safe from the burning winds.
