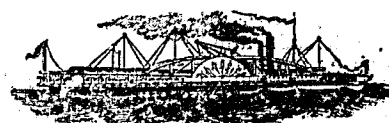

DENISON, TEXAS, May 20.

The wheat crop is out of danger and will be the largest ever raised in Northern Texas. It will be ready for market the first of June. Cotton looks finely. Trains are crowded with emigrants.

NEW YORK, May 20.

A large public meeting of the Society of Metropolitan Catholic Total Abstinence Union was held last evening in Cooper Institute. Rev. J. H. McGeau presided. Resolutions were adopted that the circulating excitement, legislative experiments, and political agitation, offered poor hope for the completeness or permanency of reform. The only thorough prohibition is self-prohibition, enforced by individual conscience, as schooled by God's Church.

NEW ORLEANS, May 20.

The jury is completed in the United States Court for the trial of the Grant Parish prisoners. The trial will occupy a week or more.

PARIS, May 20.

Prince Metternich's second refusal to allow a duel with Count Montebello to take place.

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 20.

The ground is alive with grasshoppers in Southern Minnesota.

WASHINGTON, May 20.

The House passed a resolution to adjourn on the 23d of June.

The Senate has up the Civil Rights Bill.

SPRINGFIELD, May 21.

Twenty of the missing have been dug from the ruins of the buildings, and it is said that 25 known to be lost are still in the debris.

Committee of the Legislature find that specifications were not fulfilled by the contractors in the construction of the reservoir. \$50,000 has been contributed for relief of the victims.

It appears that the Walls of the city below the ground, contractors based them on the surface making the calamity a mere question of time. Contractors will be hanged if caught.
