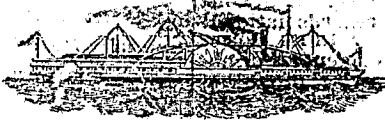

The case of the State vs John Lewis,

charged with the murder of Hardy

Jackson, came up for preliminary

John Lewis had a quarrel with the de-

ceased and shot him. After Jackson

got well he met Lewis and beat him

him with a stick. After that Lewis

squatted upon some land belonging to

Mr. J. D. Fay of Autauga county and

proceeded to cultivate it without pay-

ment. But when the last harvest

came it carried off the old fellow's cabin

and he moved elsewhere. After the

waters had receded Mr. Fay rented

the land which Lewis had

abandoned to Hardy Jackson and

Hardy was proceeding to plant it

down in corn, when on last Monday

Lewis appeared on the scene and de-

manded possession. Hardy refused to

give it. He said that Mr. Fay had in-

structed him to plant corn on that

ground, and he was only carrying out

his instructions. Lewis then took

some seed corn and commenced plant-

ing it on that which Hardy had already

put in the ground. But growing tired

of this fun, he retired after awhile, to

return and repeat the experiment next

day. On Tuesday he commenced as

before, with a demand for the posses-

sion of the land, and when that was

refused, planted some more corn on

top of Hardy's planting and again re-

turned. The next morning Hardy

Jackson's wife saw Lewis slip-

ping along in the attitude of

one who is approaching a bird

to get a shot. She said that he

thought he was hunting and that he

had found some game on which he

was endeavoring to steal unperceived.

A few moments later she heard the

report of his musket, but still thought

nothing of it and returned to her cab-

in where she was soon confronted by

Lewis who said: "I have killed your

husband." "No! John—you are jok-

ing," she answered. "No I'm not

joking," was the cruel reply, "I've

killed him deader than hell!" and, so

saying, passed quietly on his way.

Alarmed by the words, and not qui-

etened by the manner of Lewis, she

hastened to the field where her husband

had been at work and found him dead.

He had fallen backwards in the furrow

he had been opening. His legs were

doubled under him. One arm, around

which his plow lines were still

fastened, had been pulled to its full

stretch by the mule, and his head and

neck were filled full of buck shot—

fourteen of which had taken effect

upon him.

This is the substance of all the testi-

mony in the case—in consideration of

which Justice Fuller committed Lewis

to jail without bail. Messrs. B. C.

Tarver and J. G. Winter, represented

the defence.

GRANGERS' COLUMN.

Iron and Steel.

Finding that the quality of the English steel is so superior that the makers of circular saws, axes, and all the finer kinds of edged tools, are compelled to use it, the American steel manufacturers are combining in an appeal to Congress to put a higher duty on an article with which they cannot compete. By doing this they would be out of the market a few manufacturing corporations will monopolize the business and make large profits; but the result would be that the American workmen would have to pay high prices for inferior tools. The pig iron men also want more protection. Notwithstanding the heavy duties already imposed on imported pig iron, the Pennsylvania iron masters complain that they cannot get along. They want Congress to add ten per cent. to the present duty on pig iron. So we go.—*Baltimore Gazette.*

Cotton Factories at Mobile.

An interesting report from Mr. L. R. Irwin was read last evening before the Board of Control, relative to the establishment of cotton factories at Mobile. The great difficulty in the way of inaugurating such enterprises is an overestimate in the public mind as to the cost of taking the first practical steps, and as to the time required for success. The great wealth of New England is the growth of half a century, and the first step towards it was taken through the enterprise of a single individual.

In the year 1813 a wealthy and intelligent young Bostonian was made prisoner and taken to England, where he was struck with the inventions of Arkwright and Hargreaves, as applied to the British cotton manufacture. This young man, whose name still lives in this connection, in that great manufacturing marvel of Massachusetts, the town of Lowell, with the aid of an ingenious Scotchman, Samuel Slater by name, returning home, selected Waltham, on the Charles River (a stream since made famous in song as well as in story), as the site of his experiment; and from that grain of mustard seed has sprung up the forest of factories, which has since flourished on New England soil. Speaking of this matter but very recently, one of the most eminent citizens of Massachusetts made this remarkable prophecy which may be much nearer its fulfillment than either he or the great majority of his hearers imagined. Gen. Banks used this language:

"The industrial processes discovered by Lowell will not have been thoroughly established until the cotton of the country shall have been utilized by manufacturers on the land where it is produced, as well as iron, over the inexhaustible beds of ore and coal which nature has so lavishly enriched this country."—*Mobile Register.*

The Coming Cotton Crop.

In view of the disastrous floods and overflows of the spring, the question is becoming an interesting one as to the probable cotton crop of the present year. It is estimated that in the three States of Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana, the amount of cotton land despoiled will aggregate fully half a million acres, of which nearly half lie in the State of Louisiana. It is conceded that the land overflowed in these States is probably unsurpassed in productivity; they are, unquestionably, among the finest cotton lands in the world; and the yield of cotton produce is placed by some of the Southern journals at from three to four hundred thousand bales. The season is now so far advanced and the subsidence of the waters so slow, that they cannot possibly be reclaimed this year, and the cotton, as well as the immense sugar estates now, or recently, covered by the waste of waters, are practically beyond the reach of cultivation before another planting season arrives.

In view of the present outlook, therefore, speculation is rife as to the future prices of cotton, and many are holding to the theory that because of such a calamitous occurrence in the richest section South, that cotton will assuredly command high prices. There is one view to take of the present situation which leads to the inference that the supposed deficiency in the crop will be considerably extent to the north. The rising of the waters and the overflow and great destruction of the crops came upon the South at an early period in the season, and with the devastation generally known everywhere, it is altogether probable that a large additional area of cotton seed is already planted, both on the highlands and lowlands, which the floods have not reached. Texas most assuredly will very largely increase the area of her cotton crop, and in Tennessee, the Carolinas, Alabama, Georgia, and on the uplands in those States where the greatest damage by the flood has been sustained, every exertion has been made to do battle up the crop. In this view of the situation the deficiency seems likely to be made up to a larger extent than many suppose, although the quality may be less desirable. This calamity is a serious blow to the cotton crop of the South where cotton and sugar are the chief, in fact the only, staples upon which the planters have to rely, but the country overflowed is composed in great part of land so rich and productive that the losses sustained this year can be nearly made up during a single season of uninterrupted prosperity.—*Nashville Union & American.*

The Report Incorrect.

Superintendent G. M. Dew writes that we were misinformed in reference to the application of colored children to be admitted into the white schools, and that no such application had been made to him either directly or indirectly. We are glad to hear this. As we stated, we do not believe such an application would be countenanced by a respectable colored people. We heard the reports from various sources late Tuesday night, one informant telling us that a gentleman had just given him the statement that he knew the fact. It was too late to find authoritative, and we think our readers should be informed of such things notwithstanding the disapproval of President Coleman.—*Columbus Enquirer.*
